# **Don't Let Lawmakers Undermine the Clean Air Act: It Saves Lives**

A handful of lawmakers in the <u>Senate</u> and <u>House</u> have been trying to block the EPA from regulating global warming pollution. This is largely a political maneuver--an effort to drain away Senate support for passing a comprehensive clean energy and climate bill.

Some say that at least <u>Senator Rockefeller's bill</u> - unlike Senator Murkowski's - does not question the science of climate change. Yet in the end, both bills would paralyze the EPA and weaken the Clean Air Act--a bedrock law that has <u>saved hundreds of thousands of lives</u> over its <u>40-year</u> <u>history</u>.

You see, the Clean Air Act requires the EPA to regulate air pollutants that endanger human health and the environment. The Supreme Court <u>recently ruled</u> that the Clean Air Act unambiguously covers all air pollutants, including greenhouse gases.

Last year, the EPA issued an <u>endangerment finding</u>--a conclusion that global warming pollution is hazardous to our health and the environment.

This is precisely what some lawmakers want to overturn. But if Congress gets to pick and choose which pollutants and which science-based findings it wants to enforce, then the Clean Air Act could quickly become the Dirty Air Act, rooted in political science instead medical science.

Imagine if lawmakers had blocked the Clean Air Act rule to phase lead out of gasoline. Industry leaders certainly tried, and the fight over the lead looked a lot like the current battle over global warming pollution.

It too started with an EPA endangerment finding, one that said lead in gasoline was a threat to public health. Oil companies claimed that the science wasn't strong enough to justify the costs. Typical of industry's scare campaign was this letter from a Gulf Oil Corporation executive to the EPA in 1972:

"Before the EPA imposes regulations that can have an adverse effect on the nation's economy and unnecessarily waste our nation's natural resources, there should be general agreement in the medical and scientific community of the actual need to restrict lead additives from a public health standpoint...Such agreement does not exist at this time."

That sounds hauntingly familiar. Yet if those voices had prevailed back in the 1970s, and we delayed removing lead from gasoline for another 10 years, <u>300,000 more children</u> would have had IQs below 70 and tens of thousands of adults would have suffered from heart disease, stroke, and hypertension.

Instead, the EPA moved forward with it lead rule and created the most successful program in its history--one that has been replicated around the world. Here in America, lead emissions from cars dropped by 95 percent by 1999. And while in the late 1970s, 88 percent of American children had blood lead levels surpassing the CDC's level of concern, by 2000, only 2.2 percent of American children did.

The science on lead proved to be right, and no one doubts lead's dangers today. But EPA acted, rightly, well before every last issue and denial was resolved. Despite the organized effort by deniers to confuse the public, the scientific consensus on the causes and severity of climate change is actually far more robust today than was the case for lead in the 1970s. The EPA was right to act then, and the EPA is right to act now.

The lead program is just one of the more famous of the Clean Air Act's victories, but there are many others:

- By making all new diesel engines more than 90 percent cleaner, the EPA will prevent more than 21,000 premature deaths and 160 billion in health costs every year by 2030.
- By phasing out the most dangerous ozone-depleting chemicals, the EPA will cut the American incidences of non-melanoma skin cancer by 295 million by 2075.
- By launching the acid rain program, the EPA has dramatically reduced soot and smog by levels that will reduce premature deaths by between 20,000 and 50,000 per year in 2010.
- These are remarkable achievements--each one brought to you by the Clean Air Act. But history shows that these live-saving programs could have been thwarted by just the kind

of amendments lawmakers are using today to block the EPA's greenhouse gas rule.

NRDC is fighting these efforts to undermine the Clean Air Act. We believe the EPA must be allowed to carry out its job of regulating global warming pollution.

But we also believe that an EPA rule will only complete half the job of fighting climate change. To fully unleash innovation, offer incentives that drive down the price of clean energy, and create nearly 2 million jobs, Congress needs to pass comprehensive clean energy and climate legislation.

But in the meantime, we can not allow the Clean Air Act to become the Dirty Air Act. Click <u>here</u> to tell your lawmakers not to support any amendments that will hamper the EPA from doing its job--the job of protecting Americans from dangerous pollution.

Please see the story pasted below. As a protective measure, this morning I emailed the following message to the Kerry, Graham, and Lieberman staffs:

Hi Kathleen, Matt, and Danielle,

EPA's economic computer modeling team has started clearing its decks, because we recognize that there is some possibility that your bosses might ask EPA to start modeling specifications of a climate bill at some point in the next few weeks. I think we have previously sent you a list of the many legislative details that you need to specify in order for EPA's economic computer models to run. That list is based on an assumption that the structure of the bill tracks the structure of the House-passed bill. Any significant divergence from the structure of the House-passed bill might change the list of needed specifications, and might also significantly change the amount of time that it takes EPA to produce an economic computer modeling report. When she is asked publicly about how long it takes EPA to generate a report, Administrator Jackson is careful to say "6-8 weeks from the date we receive the last of the detailed specifications that are needed." The fastest EPA has ever done it was 5 weeks, but that was for a bill (the Energy & Commerce chairman's mark) that was nearly identical to the bill that we had most recently modeled (the introduced Waxman-Markey bill). Please let me know if you'd like to schedule a Q and A session with EPA's economic computer modelers in order to get an updated sense of the specifications that would be needed.

## **CLIMATE: Senators share emission bill's details with industry** groups (Wednesday, March 17, 2010) Darren Samuelsohn, E&E senior reporter

Lawmakers at the heart of Senate energy and climate negotiations revealed key details today of their legislative proposal during a closed-door meeting with major industry groups they are courting in hopes of winning over Senate moderates and avoiding an expensive advertising war.

Sens. John Kerry (D-Mass.), Lindsey Graham (R-S.C.) and Joe Lieberman (I-Conn.) shared an eight-page outline of their draft legislation that would reduce greenhouse gas emissions over the next four decades, including provisions to limit business costs while ramping up domestic production of oil, gas and nuclear power.

According to several sources in the meeting room, the bill calls for greenhouse gas curbs across multiple economic sectors, with a 2020 target of reducing emissions by 17 percent below 2005 levels and an 80 percent limit at midcentury. Power plant emissions would be regulated in 2012, with other major industrial sources being phased in starting in 2016.

In a bow to industry demands, the senators' proposal would pre-empt U.S. EPA climate regulations under the Clean Air Act and halt dozens of state climate laws

and regulations now on the books. Also, only facilities that release 25,000 tons per year of greenhouse gases must participate in the climate program.

Additional layers of certainty for industry come via a "hard price collar" that limits greenhouse gas allowances to between \$10 and \$30 per ton tagged to inflation, with an increase at a to-be-determined "fixed rate" over time. The legislation would also set aside a "strategic reserve" of 4 billion greenhouse gas credits that could be released into the market to help control price volatility fluctuations.

Overall, the bill will include eight titles: Refining, America's Farmers, Consumer Refunds, Clean Energy Innovation, Coal, Natural Gas, Nuclear and Energy Independence. And it will set up new nationwide standards for energy efficiency and renewable energy, as well as ideas on carbon market regulation crafted by Sens. Maria Cantwell (D-Wash.) and Susan Collins (R-Maine).

The senators collected their eight-page document from the industry officials before the meeting ended, and they declined comment on those details as they left the session. Nonetheless, several sources at the meeting confirmed the specifics shared by the senators.

"We obviously talked some substance," Kerry said. "We went through an outline of things we're thinking about."

Kerry said a full outline of the bill will be delivered Tuesday to a larger group of senators who have been working over the last year on the climate and energy issue. The senators also hope to send their proposal to EPA and the Congressional Budget Office by the end of next week for a five-tosix-week interagency analysis, although the timing on that depends in part on two legislative counsel staffers who are out on maternity leave.

"It's just the logistics of getting the language done," Kerry said. "So I'm not going to tell you exactly. But our target is somewhere toward that period of time or during the break."

The senators' meeting included about a dozen top trade associations, including representatives from the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, Edison Electric Institute and American Petroleum Institute. Several of those officials left the meeting giving the three senators credit for their effort.

"Directionally speaking, the way they're trying to conform and shape this bill I'd suggest is largely in sync with what most people in American industry think is the direction you're going to have to go if you're going to have a successful program," said Bruce Josten, executive vice president for government affairs at the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. "Now there's a lot of ifs, ands and buts, but if you're asking for a broad statement, that's a broad statement."

John Shaw, senior vice president of government affairs at the Portland Cement Association, called the meeting's tone "very positive."

"I think many of the industry sectors are willing to work with the senators to achieve positive public policy results," Shaw said, "but the devil is in the details, and folks are very anxious to see those details."







Industries are eager to streamline any forthcoming climate rules under a consistent federal program. "We believe there should be one uniform congressional policy on greenhouse gases -- not state by state, not overlapping with other environmental requirements -- one program," the industry official said.

But state regulators are wary that the draft bill could overly restrict their authority.

"I hope the sponsors, in pursuing support from the U.S. Chamber of Commerce and other industrial groups, have not crossed the line on pre-emption," said Bill Becker, executive director of the National Association of Clean Air Agencies. Becker's group represents state and local air pollution control agencies nationwide.

"Climate change is such a monumental problem that action at all levels -- local, state and federal -is essential if we are serious about achieving our ultimate goals," Becker added. "Future climate legislation should build upon this successful partnership, not supplant it, and preserve the rights of state and local governments to take more stringent actions where needed."

Bill Snape, senior counsel for the Center for Biological Diversity, said his group would oppose Clean Air Act limitations. "I think if there are Clean Air Act pre-emptions in it, it's a deal-killer," Snape said. "We're going to go after it as hard as we know how."

Snape's group has been a vocal proponent of preserving EPA's Clean Air Act authorities under any climate legislation. The organization was also among 26 environmental groups that sent a <u>letter</u> to senators this week urging them to oppose a bill sponsored by Sen. Jay Rockefeller (D-W.Va.) that seeks to postpone EPA climate rules for stationary sources for two years.

Architects of the bill yesterday defended the pre-emption provisions.

Graham said the authors of the bill sought to develop a single national approach to cut carbon across sectors. "I wouldn't support, you know, EPA regulation on top of congressional action, and I couldn't support 50 states coming up with their own standard," he said.

Graham is a co-sponsor of a measure from Sen. Lisa Murkowski (R-Alaska) that would block EPA's authority to regulate greenhouse gases.

The energy and climate bill that cleared the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee last year would prohibit EPA from regulating greenhouse gases as air toxics and from setting nationwide emission limits, but would allow EPA to require NSR and Title V permits from large facilities.

"It wasn't in our earlier bills, but in terms of getting this energy independence, job-creating carbon pollution bill going, this gives the business community the predictability that they need. It's very important to them," Lieberman said.

## Ohio governor seeks delay for EPA regs

Ohio Gov. Ted Strickland (D) is urging EPA Administrator Lisa Jackson to hold off on regulating greenhouse gases.

In a <u>letter</u> sent Monday to EPA, Strickland expressed "deep concerns" with the agency's impending regulatory approach and the effect those rules will have on Ohio's economy and families by subjecting large numbers of stationary sources to permitting requirements.

He also expressed concerns that although EPA is poised to soon begin requiring stationary sources to install "best achievable control technology" to curb their greenhouse gases, the agency has not yet offered a clear idea of what BACT for greenhouse gases should be for large industrial facilities. EPA has convened a working group to help draft guidance for industries about what those requirements will be.

Strickland asked EPA to delay greenhouse gas rules until Congress passes a comprehensive climate bill or until commercially available BACT exists to meet Clean Air Act requirements. EPA officials say the agency is bound by science and the law to move forward with the rules after the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in 2007 that the agency had the authority to regulate greenhouse gas emissions.

Jackson has said that EPA plans to gradually begin phasing in permitting requirements starting with the largest stationary sources next year.

Additionally, it would pre-empt state and regional cap-and-trade programs. Industries are eager to streamline any forthcoming climate rules under a consistent federal program.

"We believe there should be one uniform congressional policy on greenhouse gases -not state by state, not overlapping with other environmental requirements -- one program," the industry official said.

But state regulators are wary that the draft bill could overly restrict their authority. "I hope the sponsors, in pursuing support from the U.S. Chamber of Commerce and other industrial groups, have not crossed the line on pre-emption," said Bill Becker, executive director of the National Association of Clean Air Agencies. Becker's group represents state and local air pollution control agencies nationwide.

"Climate change is such a monumental problem that action at all levels -- local, state and federal -- is essential if we are serious about achieving our ultimate goals," Becker added. "Future climate legislation should build upon this successful partnership, not supplant it, and preserve the rights of state and local governments to take more stringent actions where needed."

Bill Snape, senior counsel for the Center for Biological Diversity, said his group would oppose Clean Air Act limitations. "I think if there are Clean Air Act pre-emptions in it, it's a deal-killer," Snape said. "We're going to go after it as hard as we know how." Snape's group has been a vocal proponent of preserving EPA's Clean Air Act authorities under any climate legislation. The organization was also among 26 environmental groups that sent a <u>letter</u> to senators this week urging them to oppose a bill sponsored by Sen. Jay Rockefeller (D-W.Va.) that seeks to postpone EPA climate rules for stationary sources for two years.

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Graham is a co-sponsor of a measure from Sen. Lisa Murkowski (R-Alaska) that would block EPA's authority to regulate greenhouse gases.

The energy and climate bill that cleared the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee last year would prohibit EPA from regulating greenhouse gases as air toxics and from setting nationwide emission limits, but would allow EPA to require NSR and Title V permits from large facilities.

"It wasn't in our earlier bills, but in terms of getting this energy independence, job-creating carbon pollution bill going, this gives the business community the predictability that they need. It's very important to them," Lieberman said.

## Ohio governor seeks delay for EPA regs

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EPA officials say the agency is bound by science and the law to move forward with the rules after the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in 2007 that the agency had the authority to regulate greenhouse gas emissions.

Jackson has said that EPA plans to gradually begin phasing in permitting requirements starting with the largest stationary sources next year.

Details emerged earlier this week that draft legislation from Sens. John Kerry (D-Mass.), Lindsey Graham (R-S.C.) and Joe Lieberman (I-Conn.) would curb EPA's authority to regulate greenhouse gases under the Clean Air Act and would limit states' climate laws and regulations. But that decision is not sitting well with some Democrats. "I don't think it should pre-empt EPA from anything," said Sen. Dianne Feinstein (D-Calif.), chairwoman of the subcommittee that oversees EPA's budget.

Sen. Sheldon Whitehouse (D-R.I.) said that EPA and state pre-emption would certainly be factors he considers when deciding whether to vote for the bill. "There are a lot of states that are out on this already, and a lot depends on my perception of whether we're undercutting their efforts and how rigorous our process is," Whitehouse said. An industry official who met Wednesday in a closed-door session with architects of the bill said the legislation would block EPA from requiring New Source Review and Title V operating permits from stationary sources based on their greenhouse gas emissions. The draft would also block the agency from regulating greenhouse gases as air toxics and from setting nationwide emission limits -- known as National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS) -- based on the emissions' effects on climate change, that person said. Additionally, it would pre-empt state and regional cap-and-trade programs. Industries are eager to streamline any forthcoming climate rules under a consistent federal program.

## Kentucky Department for Environmental Protection Modifies 27 Pending Water Quality Permits for Coal Mining

Agreement reached on process to monitor water quality in coal mining areas

**FRANKFORT**, **Ky**. – (March 19, 2010) – The Kentucky Department for Environmental Protection (DEP) today announced it is moving forward with the issuance of 27 pending water quality permits for mining operations following an extensive review process. The reviews centered on results from changes made in the Clean Water Act 402 permits by DEP. The modifications were negotiated as a result of concerns expressed by EPA during the permit review process. The concerns addressed by those comments are incorporated into the permits being issued by the Division of Water.

"This action today is a strong indication that everyone involved in this process recognizes the need to safeguard our environment while still meeting the energy and economic needs of Kentucky," said Gov. Steve Beshear. "This collaborative effort that allowed all interested parties to work toward a viable solution demonstrates the concern that we all have in making certain coal is mined properly and that all environmental issues are addressed."

In January of this year, the Kentucky Energy and Environment Cabinet, through DEP and the Department for Natural Resources (DNR), announced new protocol to minimize impacts on streams from mining operations while maintaining Approximate Original Contour (AOC). This collaborative effort between DNR, the

federal Office of Surface Mining, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, the mining industry, and environmental interests was formalized as the Fill Placement Optimization Protocol (FPOP) in a Reclamation Advisory Memorandum (RAM 145).

"The Reclamation Advisory Memorandum has been a key element in making this process work," said Energy and Environment Cabinet Secretary Len Peters. "We must continue the diligent work of monitoring the streams that could be impacted by any mining operation and following this protocol is essential to that success." Kentucky Coal Association President Bill Bissett applauded the signing of the water permits.

"The coal producers in Kentucky are prepared to work with federal and state agencies to make certain the process works for everyone's best interest. The approval of these 27 permits is a clear indicator that these coal companies have met these more stringent guidelines and that the process does work," said Bissett.

The Cabinet intends to process other pending coal mining Kentucky Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (KPDES) individual permits over the course of the next several weeks as information is received and reviewed. These permits will contain Kentucky's proposed changes in response to the EPA comments on the initial 27 public-noticed CWA 402 permits. CWA 402 permits are issued and reissued with a term of five years.





## Washington Post: EPA proposes stopping West Virginia 'mountaintop' coal mine that has permit

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency on Friday took a rare step against a proposed "mountaintop" coal mine in West Virginia -- proposing to block the mine, despite the fact that it already has a federal permit.

The move is one of the most aggressive to come out of the Obama administration's reexamination of mountaintop mining, where peaks are scraped and blasted away to reach coal seams inside. The EPA has reviewed dozens of permits and approved one large mine in January after environmental improvements were promised.

## AP: EPA recommends veto of W.Va. mining permit

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (AP) -- The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency moved Friday to veto a water quality permit for West Virginia's largest surface mine, saying the operation would cause irreversible damage to the environment.

Regional Administrator Shawn Garvin said talks with Mingo Logan Coal Corp. failed to produce an agreement to reduce potential harm at the Spruce No. 1 mine. The agency said the mining plan, which includes mountaintop removal and valley fills, would cover 2,278 acres, and would bury 7 miles of headwater streams and degrade water quality.

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But, in this case, the agency is threatening to stop the Spruce Number One mine in Logan County, W.Va., entirely -- or at least stop it from using "valley fills," depositing excess rock and rubble in nearby streams. Under the federal Clean Water Act, the EPA has the power to veto projects that would cause an "unacceptable adverse impact," but it has only used that power 12 times since 1972.

And it has never used the power in a case like this, where the mine already has a permit.

EPA will now take public comments on the proposal for 60 days and hold a

hearing on the proposal in West Virginia.

The EPA says the Spruce Number One mine, in a region of southern West Virginia about 300 miles from Washington, would bury about seven miles of streams. As toxic chemicals flow downstream from the mine rubble, the agency said, they could harm aquatic life including one of the richest concentrations of salamanders in the world.

The mine was issued a federal permit in 2007, under the Bush administration, but major mining was delayed by lawsuits from environmental groups. After the Obama White House raised questions about the mine's environmental consequences last year, the EPA began negotiations with Arch Coal, the mine's St. Louis-based parent company.

The EPA said Friday that those negotiations had failed to resolve the impasse.

"Coal, and coal mining, is part of our nation's energy future, and for that reason EPA has made repeated efforts to foster dialogue and find a responsible path forward," Shawn Garvin, EPA's regional administrator for the mid-Atlantic, said in a written press release. "But we must prevent the significant and irreversible damage that comes from mining pollution -- and the damage from this project would be irreversible."

In a statement, Arch Coal said it was "disappointed" with the decision.

"We are evaluating all possible options for relief from the government's actions and intend to vigorously defend the Spruce permit by all legal means," a company statement said.

West Virginia Gov. Joe Manchin III, who has advocated for the coal industry on this issue, issued a statement saying "I am obviously very disappointed, because, the way it stands now, it means a major loss of potential jobs."

The news was cheered by environmental groups -- some of whom had criticized the federal government for sending mixed messages, for and against mountaintop mining.

"It seems that EPA Administrator [Lisa P.] Jackson's concern over the impacts of mountaintop removal coal mining on human health and waterways is now translating into meaningful action," the Rainforest Action Network said in a statement. "We hope that the Spruce Mine veto is a sign that EPA is going to begin using its full authority to stop this devastating practice."

Mountaintop mining -- also called "mountaintop removal" mining -- accounts for about 10 percent of U.S. coal production, though it plays an outsized role in parts of Appalachia. Coal companies say the practice is essential, extracting coal that could not be reached another way.

But environmentalists say the practice destroys mountain ecosystems, buries stream valleys under tons of rubble and poisons stream life for miles downstream.

## EPA recommends veto of W.Va. mining permit

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The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers issued the permit in 2007. But EPA said it wanted to exercise its authority under the federal Clean Water Act to review the permit further.

EPA's proposal was issued Friday, the deadline set by a federal judge for the agency to make a decision.

"This recommendation is consistent with our broader Clean Water Act efforts in Central Appalachia. EPA has a duty under the law to protect water quality and safeguard the people who rely on these waters for drinking, fishing and swimming," Garvin said in a prepared statement.

The permit is the subject of a federal lawsuit challenging the corps' authority to issue clean water permits for large mountaintop removal mines. U.S. District Judge Robert Chambers has allowed mining to occur at the Logan County mine until the case in resolved.

The Ohio Valley Environmental Coalition is a plaintiff in the lawsuit. Co-Director Dianne Bady said she was pleased by EPA's decision. "We are so glad to see the Obama administration based its decision on sound science," she said.

Several members of West Virginia's congressional delegation said they were upset by the decision.

Mingo Logan is a subsidiary of St. Louis-based Arch Coal. The company said it was disappointed by EPA's action and was assessing its legal options.

"The Spruce permit is the most scrutinized and fully considered permit in West Virginia's history," the company said in statement. "The 13-year permitting process included the preparation of a full environmental impact statement, the only permit in the eastern coal fields to ever undergo such review."

Arch Coal said it would ask Chambers to rule on the company's request for summary judgment in the lawsuit. The Department of Justice asked Chambers on Friday to delay any decisions until EPA issues a final decision following a 60-day public comment period.

It's the first time since 1972 that EPA has used its authority to veto a permitted project. In nearly four decades the agency has used its authority only 12 times before a permit was issued.

Garvin said EPA determined that rock, dirt and other mining wastes from Spruce No. 1 would affect water quality, fish and wildlife in the Coal River watershed. The watershed is already one of the state's more heavily mined areas.

The mine would release high levels of total dissolved solids and selenium, which in high concentrations can create birth defects in fish and other aquatic life.

Also, the plan to replace ecological resources lost during mining was inadequate, EPA said.

The federal agency has focused on coal mining in Central Appalachia since President Barack Obama took office. The agency has concentrated on mines where mountaintop removal mining is used to expose multiple coal seams. Studies have shown the mining practice has buried hundreds of miles of streams under valley fills, that were permitted under the dredge and fill section of the Clean Water Act. Last fall, EPA said it had identified 79 permits in West Virginia, Virginia, Kentucky and Tennessee where the mining practice is used. In September, EPA said it wanted to review the Spruce No. 1 permit.

Garvin said EPA will hold a 60-day comment period on its recommendation before it makes a final decision. The agency also plans to hold a public hearing in the state.

EPA Moves to Deny Arch Coal Permit

 WASHINGTON (Dow Jones)--The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency said Friday it plans to revoke Arch Coal's (ACI) Spruce No. 1 coal mining permit, saying it would have adverse environmental impacts.
 The agency said its decision would "significantly restrict or prohibit" operations at the mine. The proposed permit veto is subject to public comment for 60 days before the agency can finalize the ruling.

**¶** The EPA denial of the project--which would have been the largest mountaintop coal mine in central Appalachia--follows failed negotiations with the company, the EPA said.

¶ The company said it would vigorously defend the permit "by all legal means."

¶ "Arch Coal is disappointed that EPA has chosen to take the unprecedented action to initiate the veto process ... against a validly issued and existing permit," the company said in a statement.

The announcement reflects a tough stance from the Obama administration on mountain top coal mining, which involves blasting off mountain tops to get at the coal underneath. The agency has received sharp criticism from environmentalists seeking to curb the industry, but has also faced strong pressure from the coal lobby and coal-state Democrats.

¶ West Virginia politicians condemned the decision. Sen. Jay Rockefeller, a Democrat, said he would push EPA officials to find a long-term solution. Gov. Joe Manchin, also a Democrat, said it would mean a major loss of jobs.

¶ "However, it is my understanding that the door is not completely closed on this process and Arch Coal will now need to look at its options on moving forward with continued discussions," Manchin said.

The agency last year put a hold on the Spruce No. 1 permit in Logan County, W.Va., and this is the first time in 37 years the EPA has used its power to revoke a previously issued mountaintop mining permit.
 The agency is reviewing dozens of coal-mine permits and has allowed others to go forward.

If Shawn Garvin, an EPA regional administrator for the Mid-Atlantic, said while coal and coal mining is part of the nation's future, "we must prevent the significant and irreversible damage that comes from mining pollution, and the damage from this project would be irreversible."

¶ The agency said the project would adversely affect drinking water, human communities and the

surrounding ecosystems.

¶ EPA said it "believes that the Spruce No. 1 project, in conjunction with numerous other mining operations either under construction or proposed for the Coal River basin, will contribute to the cumulative loss of water quality, aquatic systems, and forest resources."

¶ While environmentalists saw the decision as a victory, industry said it inserted additional uncertainty about the future of coal mining in the area.

¶ "It seems that EPA Administrator Jackson's concern over the impacts of mountaintop removal coal mining on human health and waterways is now translating into meaningful action," said Amanda Starbuck, global finance campaign director for Rainforest Action Network.

¶ Ed Hopkins, Sierra Club's Director of Environmental Quality, said he hoped the agency would follow through on the recommendation.

¶ "This massive mine would bury seven miles of streams, destroy thousands of acres of land and disrupt local communities," he said.

¶ The National Mining Association said EPA's proposed action "adds further uncertainty for jobs and economic security throughout Appalachia. We remain hopeful this and other permitting obstacles can be favorably resolved in the near future."

But, in this case, the agency is threatening to stop the Spruce Number One mine in Logan County, W.Va., entirely -- or at least stop it from using "valley fills," depositing excess rock and rubble in nearby streams. Under the federal Clean Water Act, the EPA has the power to veto projects that would cause an "unacceptable adverse impact," but it has only used that power 12 times since 1972.

And it has never used the power in a case like this, where the mine already has a permit.

EPA will now take public comments on the proposal for 60 days and hold a hearing on the proposal in West Virginia.

The EPA says the Spruce Number One mine, in a region of southern West Virginia about 300 miles from Washington, would bury about seven miles of streams. As toxic chemicals flow downstream from the mine rubble, the agency said, they could harm aquatic life including one of the richest concentrations of salamanders in the world.

The mine was issued a federal permit in 2007, under the Bush administration, but major mining was delayed by lawsuits from environmental groups. After the Obama White House raised questions about the mine's environmental consequences last year, the EPA began negotiations with Arch Coal, the mine's St. Louis-based parent company.

The EPA said Friday that those negotiations had failed to resolve the impasse.

"Coal, and coal mining, is part of our nation's energy future, and for that reason EPA has made repeated efforts to foster dialogue and find a responsible path forward," Shawn Garvin, EPA's regional administrator for the mid-Atlantic, said in a written press release. "But we must prevent the significant and irreversible damage that comes from mining pollution -- and the damage from this project would be irreversible."

In a statement, Arch Coal said it was "disappointed" with the decision.

"We are evaluating all possible options for relief from the government's actions and intend to vigorously defend the Spruce permit by all legal means," a company statement said.

West Virginia Gov. Joe Manchin III, who has advocated for the coal industry on this issue, issued a statement saying "I am obviously very disappointed, because, the way it stands now, it means a major loss of potential jobs."

The news was cheered by environmental groups -- some of whom had criticized the federal government for sending mixed messages, for and against mountaintop mining.

"It seems that EPA Administrator [Lisa P.] Jackson's concern over the impacts of mountaintop removal coal mining on human health and waterways is now translating into meaningful action," the Rainforest Action Network said in a statement. "We hope that the Spruce Mine veto is a sign that EPA is going to begin using its full authority to stop this devastating practice."

Mountaintop mining -- also called "mountaintop removal" mining -- accounts for about 10 percent of U.S. coal production, though it plays an outsized role in parts of Appalachia. Coal companies say the practice is essential, extracting coal that could not be reached another way. But environmentalists say the practice destroys mountain ecosystems,

buries stream valleys under tons of rubble and poisons stream life for miles downstream.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers issued the permit in 2007. But EPA said it wanted to exercise its authority under the federal Clean Water Act to review the permit further.

EPA's proposal was issued Friday, the deadline set by a federal judge for the agency to make a decision.

"This recommendation is consistent with our broader Clean Water Act efforts in Central Appalachia. EPA has a duty under the law to protect water quality and safeguard the people who rely on these waters for drinking, fishing and swimming," Garvin said in a prepared statement.

The permit is the subject of a federal lawsuit challenging the corps' authority to issue clean water permits for large mountaintop removal mines. U.S. District Judge Robert Chambers has allowed mining to occur at the Logan County mine until the case in resolved.

The Ohio Valley Environmental Coalition is a plaintiff in the lawsuit. Co-Director Dianne Bady said she was pleased by EPA's decision.

"We are so glad to see the Obama administration based its decision on sound science," she said.

Several members of West Virginia's congressional delegation said they were upset by the decision.





# EPA Issues Comprehensive Guidance to Protect Appalachian Communities From Harmful Environmental Impacts of Mountain Top Mining

*Guidance Provides Additional Clarity and Ensures Stronger Protection at Projects in Ohio, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Kentucky, Virginia and Tennessee* 

**WASHINGTON** - The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) today announced a set of actions to further clarify and strengthen environmental permitting requirements for Appalachian mountaintop removal and other surface coal mining projects, in coordination with federal and state regulatory agencies. Using the best available science and following the law, the comprehensive guidance sets clear benchmarks for preventing significant and irreversible damage to Appalachian watersheds at risk from mining activity.

Mountaintop removal is a form of surface coal mining in which explosives are used to access coal seams, generating large volumes of waste that bury adjacent streams. The resulting waste that then fills valleys and streams can significantly compromise water quality, often causing permanent damage to ecosystems and rendering streams unfit for swimming, fishing and drinking. It is estimated that almost 2,000 miles of Appalachian headwater streams have been buried by mountaintop coal mining.

"The people of Appalachia shouldn't have to choose between a clean, healthy environment in which to raise their families and the jobs they need to support them. That's why EPA is providing even greater clarity on the direction the Agency is taking to confront pollution from mountain top removal," said EPA Administrator Lisa P. Jackson. "We will continue to work with all stakeholders to find a way forward that follows the science and the law. Getting this right is important to Americans who rely on affordable coal to power homes and businesses, as well as coal communities that count on jobs and a livable environment, both during mining and after coal companies move to other sites."

## **EPA's Actions:**

- Improved Guidance and Clarity: EPA is communicating comprehensive guidance to its Regional offices with permitting responsibility in Appalachian states. The guidance clarifies existing requirements of the Section 402 and 404 Clean Water Act permitting programs that apply to pollution from surface coal mining operations in streams and wetlands. The guidance details EPA's responsibilities and how the Agency uses its Clean Water Act (CWA) authorities to ensure that future mining will not cause significant environmental, water quality, and human health impacts. EPA also expects this information will provide improved consistency and predictability in the CWA permitting process and help to strengthen coordination with other federal and state regulatory agencies and mining companies.
  - **Strong Science**: EPA is making publicly available two scientific reports prepared by its Office of Research and Development (ORD). One summarizes the aquatic impacts of mountaintop mining and valley fills. The second report establishes a scientific benchmark for unacceptable levels of conductivity (a measure of water pollution from mining practices) that threaten stream life in surface waters. These reports are being published for public comment and submitted for peer review to the EPA Science Advisory Board.
  - **Increased transparency**: EPA is creating a permit tracking website so that the public can determine the status of mining permits subject to the EPA- Army Corps Enhanced Coordination Procedure (ECP).

A growing body of scientific literature, including previous and new studies performed by EPA, show significant damage to local streams that are polluted with the mining runoff from mountain top removal. To protect water quality, EPA has identified a range of conductivity (a measure of the level of salt in the water) of 300 to 500 microSiemens per centimeter. The maximum benchmark conductivity of 500 microSiemens per cm is a measure of salinity that is roughly five times above normal levels. The conductivity levels identified in the clarifying guidance are intended to protect 95% of aquatic life and fresh water streams in central Appalachia.

EPA will be soliciting public comments on the new guidance. The guidance will be effective immediately on an interim basis. EPA will decide whether to modify the guidance after consideration of public comments and the results of the SAB technical review of the EPA scientific reports.

The EPA guidance identifies improvements in mining practices and operations that will reduce adverse impacts on water quality. EPA will continue to work with coal companies who are interested in modifying their projects to reduce their environmental footprint and prevent harm to water quality and human health. Earlier this year, EPA approved the Hobet 45 permit in West Virginia. Working with the mining company, EPA was able to reduce stream impacts by almost 50 percent and minimize mine runoff into surface waters. Those changes helped permanently protect local waters, maximize coal recovery and reduce costs for the operators.

In contrast, EPA recently proposed to significantly restrict or prohibit mountaintop mining at the Spruce No. 1 surface mine in Logan County, West Virginia. Attempts at dialogue with the company failed to ensure a significant decrease of environmental and water quality impacts from the project. The Spruce No. 1 mine, as proposed, would bury over 7 miles of headwater streams, directly impact 2,278 acres of forestland, and degrade water quality in streams adjacent to the mine. The project was permitted in 2007 and subsequently delayed by litigation.

EPA's guidance offers recommendations to its Regions on the application of the National Environmental Policy Act to surface coal mining projects permitted by the Army Corps of Engineers. The Corps is separately announcing plans for rulemaking to expand the scope of NEPA review. EPA is supportive of this effort and will work closely with the Army Corps.

# Additional Comprehensive Guidance

EPA is issuing comprehensive guidance clarifying the standards that its Regions should apply in permitting reviews of Appalachian surface coal mining projects under the Clean Water Act. This guidance directs EPA field staff to coordinate with their Federal and state regulatory partners to strengthen the environmental review of new Appalachian surface coal mining projects and to improve protection of the communities' local water and environment. More specifically, the guidance:

- Incorporates the latest scientific information in clarifying how Clean Water Act (CWA) permits should assure compliance with existing water quality standards to protect the use of streams by communities and to ensure healthy aquatic life.
- Clarifies how CWA requirements apply to the disposal of mining overburden in streams to reduce the size and number of valley fills, to limit water quality contamination of streams near mining operations, and to prevent significant environmental degradation of streams and wetlands.
- Improves opportunities for the voices of adversely affected Appalachian communities to be heard in the process of reviewing proposed new mining operations.

# EPA Releases Two Draft Scientific Reports for Public Comment

Field-Based Aquatic Life Benchmark for Conductivity

This draft report adapts EPA's traditional approach for developing water quality criteria to field data in central Appalachia in order to develop a conductivity benchmark protective of stream life in Appalachian surface waters. Conductivity is a measure of the level of salinity (salt) in the water. There are mining materials that are dumped or runoff into water that can raise the salinity level that turns fresh water into salty water. When this happens, living organism have difficulty surviving because they cannot tolerate the high salinity level.

The draft report makes the following conclusions:

- The salinity of water has been shown to negatively affect aquatic organisms (stream life).
- o By plotting the conductivity levels at which organisms are no longer

observed in streams, we can determine a level of conductivity that results in their loss. EPA identified a benchmark of 300 microSiemens per cm (units of conductivity) that protects 95% of aquatic organisms living in streams in central Appalachia.

- EPA derived this benchmark using more than 2,000 field samples collected in West Virginia. These results were validated using data from Kentucky.
- Although the method is applicable to any region, the value 300 is only applicable to Central Appalachian streams containing the types of salts found in those streams.
- Additional analyses demonstrate that the observed effects on the aquatic community are due types of salts that are consistent with minerals leached from mountaintop mining operations and not to other variables that were evaluated.
- Mountaintop Mining / Valley Fill Impacts Report

EPA's Office of Research and Development (ORD) conducted a literature review of peer-reviewed studies focusing on aquatic environmental and water quality impacts of mountaintop mining and valley fills. The draft report among other conclusions, found:

- Burial of headwater streams by valley fills causes permanent loss of ecosystems.
- Concentrations of salts as measured by conductivity are, on average, 10 times higher downstream of mountaintop mines and valley fills than in un-mined watersheds.
- The increased levels of salts disrupt the life cycle of freshwater aquatic organisms and some cannot live in these waters.
- Water with high salt concentrations downstream of mountaintop mines and valley fills is toxic to stream organisms. To date, there is no evidence that streams that undergo a restoration process have returned to their normal ecological functions after the mining is completed.

#### Why the Clean Air Act May Be Past Its Prime

Challenges such as global warming are beyond the scope of the law, they argue–and even some experts who think the law is beneficial complain that the Environmental Protection Agency could implement it more effectively.

Is the venerable Clean Air Act of 1970 up to addressing the pollution problems of the 21st century?

Since it was implemented some 40 years ago, the law, which required the government to identify and set standards for pollutants identified as harmful to human health and the environment, has drastically curbed pollution from industry and automobiles. But as regulators use it to address a more ambitious agenda– dealing with greenhouse-gas emissions that many scientists say contribute to global warming– longstanding problems with the law are being put into focus.

Some critics argue that an old complaint about the law–regulators don't have to consider costs when setting pollution standards–is all the more urgent when facing a problem as broad as global warming. Even some experts who think the law is beneficial say its implementation has been overly expensive:

Because the law is so rigid, they argue, innovative pollution-fighting ideas are sometimes stifled, driving up costs.

"The Clean Air Act has been very effective, but it's not been cost-effective," says Dallas Burtraw, an economist with Resources for the Future, a nonpartisan Washington think tank.

Other critics say the law has a big blind spot: It gives the Environmental Protection Agency too little authority to combat pollution from one state that drifts into another—even though studies show that air quality in a given area can be affected by pollutants from a different region, nation or continent.

### A Global Challenge

Over the years, the Clean Air Act has been credited by its supporters with reducing emissions of toxic lead, sulfur dioxide and carbon monoxide, and raising consciousness among ordinary Americans about the importance of pollution control. The question of whether 1970s-era environmental laws are suited to today's problems is gaining urgency as the Obama administration moves to tackle climate change through its powers under the act.

Business groups and critics in Congress say that the measure wasn't designed to address global warming, and that the law's provisions will lead to regulations that wind up stifling growth and killing jobs.

The Obama administration says the effects of greenhouse gases compel action, as does a 2007 Supreme Court decision. The court found that the Clean Air Act authorizes the EPA to regulate greenhouse-gas emissions if the agency determines they cause or contribute to air pollution that may reasonably be anticipated to endanger public health or welfare. Moreover, administration officials say, the EPA has the authority to tweak the thresholds, so as to regulate only big emitters, such as power plants and refineries, and minimize the economic costs.

The EPA hasn't said how much it expects new controls on greenhouse-gas emissions would cost the economy. But in a recent speech, the EPA's administrator, Lisa Jackson, noted that dire predictions about the Clean Air Act's implementation have often been wrong. Auto makers and the U.S. Chamber of Commerce howled when the EPA mandated unleaded gasoline and catalytic converters 30 years ago, Ms. Jackson said. "Yet the auto industry survived," and later studies estimated the rule produced health benefits of \$17 billion per year, she added.

For another measure, a 2004 study by the National Research Council of the National Academies–the nation's top scientific-advisory group–concluded that the act's implementation "has had and will probably continue to have substantial net economic benefits."

## Hard to Meet

At the same time, though, the report criticized the EPA's implementation of the act, saying it has been overly bureaucratic, with a focus on process rather than results. While the law's benefits outweigh its costs, the report argued, the costs have been higher than necessary.

Under the law, the EPA sets air-quality standards and requires states to submit plans laying out how they'll meet those standards. States that don't submit plans risk losing federal highway dollars. But because the law calls for separate standards for different pollutants, the EPA tends to approach pollution problems in piecemeal fashion, even though some, such as ozone and particulate matter, are caused by the same sources and could be controlled with related technologies.

According to the National Research Council report, states and cities spend "extensive amounts" of time and money on "a legalistic, and often frustrating, proposal and review process" that "discourages innovation and experimentation," overtaxes budgets, and diverts time and money from "the more germane issues" of actually meeting air-quality standards.

Mr. Burtraw, who served on the NRC panel, cites efforts to improve air quality by reducing emissions of

ammonia and methane from animal feedlots. Technology exists that could allow feedlot operators to enclose manure piles and capture the ammonia and methane they generate, while providing biogas to allow the feedlots to produce their own electricity. Capturing the ammonia would reduce fine particulates that cause respiratory problems, and reduce odor.

But doing so also would release small amounts of nitrogen oxide that contribute to ozone. Clean Air Act-directed controls on ozone tend to discourage permitting of electricity generation at animal feedlots. As a result, Mr. Burtraw says, the conversion and cleanup of animal-feedlot operations is undermined and made more expensive.

EPA officials say they are working with states and cities to reduce some of the burdens associated with implementing the law while still improving air quality. "We're continually looking for innovative approaches that will help states and EPA to minimize procedural issues and maximize health and environmental protections," the agency said in a written statement.

## The Wrong Emphasis?

Many state and local governments, meanwhile, grumble about another aspect of the law: Even when they ratchet down emissions in their backyard, they say, they still wind up violating federal standards, because of pollution that blows from other jurisdictions. Michael Morris, director of transportation for the North Central Texas Council of Governments, estimates that roughly half the air pollution responsible for ozone in his region actually comes from power plants, refineries and other facilities located in jurisdictions beyond his members' control.

The EPA has moved to address such criticisms. In 2004, the agency announced a new regulation that attempted to control power-plant pollution that drifts across state lines. In 2008, however, a federal appeals court struck down the rule. The EPA is at work on a new rule, expected to be unveiled in the coming weeks. But it's not clear whether the new regulation will satisfy the court. The Senate is considering a measure that would give the EPA broader authority to crack down on interstate pollution. But the bill's fate is highly uncertain, partly because of lawmakers' preoccupation with other issues—including whether to pass separate legislation aimed at controlling greenhouse-gas emissions.



Architects of the Senate climate bill yesterday confirmed plans to limit state and federal climate change programs but signaled that a sweeping measure from Sen. George Voinovich goes further than they plan to.

"The regulatory system set up in our bill would pre-empt the state governments and the federal government, including the power that EPA has certified by the court on greenhouse gases," said Sen. Joe Lieberman (I-Conn.), who will roll out draft climate legislation Monday with Sens. John Kerry (D-Mass.) and Lindsey Graham (R-S.C.). "We are definitely looking at saying that if our bill passes, it would be the law of the land to provide predictability," Lieberman added.

Limiting the ability of states or U.S. EPA to regulate greenhouse gas emissions outside the authority of a climate bill has been an ongoing fight for more than a year, but Voinovich (R-Ohio) threw a new wrinkle in the debate yesterday.

Voinovich is circulating a **proposal** that would go beyond Clean Air Act pre-emptions to block the federal government from regulating greenhouse gas emissions under laws including the Endangered Species Act, the Clean Water Act and the National

Environmental Policy Act. The amendment would fully prohibit states from regulating greenhouse gases based on their effects on climate change and would prohibit public nuisance litigation related to climate change.

Notably, Voinovich's measure would also prevent EPA from moving forward with its part of a joint rulemaking finalized this month with the Transportation Department. The rules seek to raise the fuel economy of the nation's passenger fleet while imposing the first-ever greenhouse gas standards on cars and trucks.

But Voinovich's measure would give the Transportation Department exclusive authority to regulate greenhouse gases from automobiles and "would not allow EPA to move forward with its tailpipe standards," a Voinovich aide said yesterday.

"We're kicking EPA out of that, but quite frankly, we didn't think EPA should have been there anyway," the aide added.

The proposal expands significantly on the pre-emption language included in the House-passed climate bill (<u>H.R. 2454</u>) and in previous versions of Senate climate bills. The House bill from Reps. Henry Waxman (D-Calif.) and Ed Markey (D-Mass.) would

block U.S. EPA from regulating greenhouse gases under certain Clean Air Act provisions and would impose a five-year timeout during which states and localities could not implement or enforce their own caps on greenhouse gas emissions. And a climate bill from Sen. Barbara Boxer (D-Calif.) that cleared the Environment and Public Works Committee last year would also curtail EPA's ability to regulate greenhouse gases under some Clean Air Act provisions and included a five-year timeout on state emission caps.

Voinovich, who is retiring at the end of the year, said his vote on a climate bill is partially dependent on the measure including the pre-emption language. "To get my support on any climate change legislation, it must include a comprehensive

pre-emption provision that goes well beyond language included in previous climate bills," Voinovich said in a statement.

Neither Lieberman or Kerry had read the proposed amendment, but Lieberman said Monday's climate bill will have language is "similar" to the measure being floated by Voinovich but that it sounds like the Ohio Republican's amendment "goes a little further."

Kerry said he would oppose the amendment from Voinovich. Asked whether the authors had an alternative, he said, "We hope to have a rational approach," but he declined to offer details.

Voinovich's bill immediately drew the ire of environmentalists pressing to preserve EPA and state regulatory authority.

"What Senator Voinovich is proposing is simply outrageous," said Earthjustice senior legislative representative Sarah Saylor. "He is saying is that the most fundamental and effective environmental laws that this country has had in place for decades should not apply to the single-most pressing environmental threat today."

Bill Snape, senior counsel at the Center for Biological Diversity, said Voinovich is "setting down a marker of what it's going to take to get his vote, and I think to get his vote under the conditions that he's setting isn't worth it."

This is not the first attempt from Voinovich to limit state and EPA climate rules. He floated a draft bill in 2008 as an alternative to climate legislation from Lieberman and then-Sen. John Warner (R-Va.) that called for the pre-emption of all state climate laws and an end to the Clean Air Act's New Source Review permit program.

Some senators hoping to limit EPA and state rules signaled support yesterday for Voinovich's measure.

Sen. John Thune (R-S.D.), who has supported past efforts to block EPA, said he "can't imagine [Kerry, Graham and Lieberman] agreeing to it," but "that's what we've been trying to get." Thune added, however, that he would not likely support the forthcoming climate bill.

Sen. Jay Rockefeller (D-W.Va.) also said he would support the amendment. Rockefeller last month introduced legislation (<u>S. 3702</u>) that would block EPA for two years from regulating greenhouse gases from industrial sources like power plants, manufacturers and other large facilities.

## Pursuing Bipartisan Talks, Republicans Hold Fire On TSCA **Reform Bills**

Republicans are holding fire and reserving comment on just-introduced bills to overhaul the Toxic Substances Control Act (TSCA) and are working with Democrats on bipartisan talks over reforming federal toxics law, with one industry source saying the GOP has nothing to gain by attacking the bills at a "premature date."

Industry has raised early concerns about TSCA reform legislation introduced this month by Sen. Frank Lautenberg (D-NJ) and a House discussion draft bill floated by Reps. Henry Waxman (D-CA) and Bobby Rush (D-IL), warning the bill's safety standards could be impossible to meet and could stymie innovation.

But the GOP appears to be holding back from criticizing the bill, at least while lawmakers digest the legislation and hold out the possibility of reaching bipartisan consensus. "We believe that the Lautenberg effort is a sincere effort," says a Senate GOP source. Republican Senate staffers are currently working with Lautenberg's office on the bill, including the possibility of future hearings at an undetermined date, according to the source.

The industry source says that the GOP may be holding its fire on the TSCA reform bills because it can only be seen to say "no" on a certain number of issues, and has already done so on climate, health care and financial legislation. "How many things can you go negative on at one time?" the source asks.

Further, because industry groups support the need for some sort of TSCA reform, "there would be no payday for Republicans at this point" to criticize the bill. Industry has also only recently started analyzing the Senate bill and House discussion draft and have yet to communicate their analysis to lawmakers, the source says.

House lawmakers are already holding a series of stakeholder meetings continuing through May on the lower chamber's bill, beginning April 19 with a session on data development and testing. The industry source says the first meeting was "good" and says House Democrats are "listening" to stakeholders.

The broad efforts to reach out to industry and the GOP on the bills could help Lautenberg in his expressed desire to use his introduced bill as "an invitation for all to play a part" in TSCA reform. Lautenberg said at a March 9 Senate Environment & Public Works Committee (EPW) hearing, "I look forward to working with Senators on both sides of the aisle to refine the bill so it makes our environment cleaner, our children healthier and our economy stronger."

EPA Administrator Lisa Jackson -- a proponent of TSCA reform to strengthen EPA's authority to regulate new and existing chemicals -- has also said she would prefer a bipartisan approach to the legislation.

# **Jackson Statements**

At an April 20 event at George Washington University in Washington, DC, Jackson said of TSCA reform, "I think that there will be real momentum -- again, I hope bipartisan -- behind the idea that in this day and age, in the year 2010, we have a right to expect more control of chemicals. And that companies that want to import these chemicals or produce them do all the testing and get that data out and make it available publicly."

Senate Republicans' willingness to work with Lautenberg on his bill could provide some room for negotiation to incorporate key GOP principles for TSCA reform in chemicals management legislation.

Sen. James Inhofe (R-OK), ranking member on EPW, in a Sept. 30 statement said that TSCA currently "protects human health and the environment." However, Inhofe said he is "open to considering changes

to the law, but only if those changes modernize chemical reviews, increase public understanding of the process, and strengthen protections for human health and the environment," according to the senator's statement.

Inhofe outlined "fundamental" principles for TSCA reform, that include: using data based on the best available risk-based science; including cost-benefit considerations for the private sector and consumers; protecting proprietary business information; prioritizing reviews for existing chemicals; not including any provision that encourages litigation or citizen suits; and not including any provision that "compels product substitution."

"I look forward to working with EPA, stakeholders, and other lawmakers to ensure that any changes to TSCA follow these general principles," Inhofe said.

While stakeholders are still reviewing the 100-plus page bills, industry has identified initial areas of concern. For example, on an April 15 conference call, Cal Dooley of the American Chemistry Council raised concerns about the safety standard in the Senate bill, while a key former EPA official has noted "bias" against new chemicals in the data requirements laid out in the bill that could stymie innovation (<u>see related</u> <u>story</u>).

At least one Senate Republican is also raising questions about whether innovation would be stymied under the proposal. In an April 20 statement, Sen. John Barrasso (R-WY) reiterated calls that reform be "based upon science and not emotion" and not stifle innovation. "We cannot adopt a bill that sets the bar so high that we prevent the development of the next life-saving chemical that can improve the lives of all Americans," he said.

The industry source also questions the broad scope of TSCA reform, because the bills focus on the production process, as well as the content of a product. "The bill would regulate everything," the source says, adding that the provisions could stir up the interest of other industry groups not engaged in the discussion, such as electronics and auto makers.

There are also questions about whether a bill could pass in the remaining congressional session, especially after EPA toxics chief Steve Owens recently said passage of TSCA reform this year is "unlikely"(<u>see related</u> <u>story</u>).

The industry source says there could be a better chance for bipartisanship after the 2010 mid-term elections, because until then Democrats are "playing to their core" and the Republicans "have no reason to give Democrats a win." Beyond the election, Republicans could be more inclined not to offer amendments "contrary to the basic thrust of the law," as in the health care debate.

Richard Denison, of the Environmental Defense Fund, speaking at an April 16 American Law Institute-American Bar Association event in Washington, DC, said that the House's aggressive schedule could lead to a bill this year, though with the bills introduced the debate will "enter the next Congress with an enormous head of steam." -- *Aaron Lovell*

Kerry: Three Big Oil Companies Likely to Back Climate Bill— By Kate Sheppard| Thu Apr. 22, 2010 4:43 PM PDT

When Sens. John Kerry, Lindsey Graham and Joe Lieberman release their climate bill on Monday, they expect to have the backing of three of the five major oil companies, Mother Jones has learned. In a conference call with a coalition of progressive business leaders on Thursday evening. Kerry said he believes those companies will "actively participate in supporting this bill." He hopes the other big oil companies will at least hold their fire on the bill, and added that he believes the American Petroleum Institute (API), the oil industry's major trade group, will call off its ad campaign attacking the legislation.Kerry also said that the Edison Electric Institute—the main trade group representing utilities will support their measure. "We are bringing to the table a significant group of players who were never there for the Waxman-Markey bill," Kerry said. (Whilie Edison supported Waxman-Markey, it was opposed by several big oil companies and API). In the teleconference, organized by the We Can Lead coalition. Kerry outlined specific details from the bill that have not previously been publicly available. Here's a rundown:• The bill would remove the Environmental Protection Agency's authority to regulate carbon dioxide under the Clean Air Act, and the states' authority to set tougher emissions standards than the federal government.• There will be no fee-or "gas tax"-on transportation fuels. Instead, oil companies would also be required to obtain pollution permits but will not trade them on the market like other polluters. How this would work is not yet clear. Agriculture would be entirely exempt from the cap on carbon emissions. Manufacturers would not be included under a cap on greenhouse gases until 2016. The bill would provide government-backed loan guarantees for the construction of 12 new nuclear power plants.• It will contain at least \$10 billion to develop technologies to capture and store emissions from coal-fired power plants.• There will be new financial incentives for natural gas.• The bill would place an upper and lower limit on the price of pollution permits, known as a hard price collar. Businesses like this idea because it ensures a stable price on carbon. Environmental advocates don't like the idea because if the ceiling is set too low, industry will have no financial incentive to move to cleaner forms of energy.• The energy bill passed by the Energy and Natural Resources Committee last year will be adopted in full, which has sparked concerns among environmentalists for its handouts to nuclear and fossil fuel interests. Some elements of the legislation remain in flux, Kerry said. The senators still haven't figured out how to deal with the contentious question of offshore drilling. He added that they are still trying to secure the support of the Chamber of Commerce, another prime foe of the House measure, but remain hopeful that they might endorse the bill.

#### Notes:

Senator Kerry just held a phone briefing explaining the provisions of the KGL bill they are "introducing on Monday". Below are my notes based on his comments:

When Senator Kerry was asked about agriculture he pointed out that farms are not covered under the bill, that farmers will receive the same rebates (through allowance rebates to utilities) that all energy users will receive and that there will be abundant offset opportunities in this bill. There was no mention of international offsets but he was not asked about them.

In the last few hours they have EEI, John Rowe, Jim Rogers, various consumer groups and three of the big five oil companies committed to supporting the bill on Monday.

Bill begins enactment in 2013 and will include caps of 17 percent target by 2020, 80 percent by 2050

There is a four year cushion for trade impacted/energy intensive entities

2/3 of all revenues go back to consumers through LDCs

\$10 billion to coal for clean coal technology with an accelerated bonus for early deployment

Nuclear title that includes loan guarantees and liability protections for up to 12 plants. They encourage modular and standardization of new plants

Vehicles: incentives for natural gas and electric vehicles

Oil companies will retire allowances at a certain date and have to buy allowances rather than a linked fee. Kerry says they will have documents issued by the CBO stating that this provision is not a tax. In order to gain the support of the Truckers Associations, they set aside all diesel oil fuel revenues and direct them to the Highway Trustfund.

Includes the entire energy bill as passed by the Senate Energy and Natural resources Committee

States and the EPA will be preempted unless the emission reduction goals stated in the bill are not met. At which point, the EPA will have some authority to ensure additional emission reductions until the goals have been met but not beyond.

Hard price collar with ceiling and floor.

I expect to hear more in the coming days/hours.





# Senator Kerry says EPA to start climate bill analysis

The EPA will examine the economic impact the bill would have from provisions aimed at reducing pollution blamed for global warming.

"We are sending the bill to be modeled now with Lindsey Graham's consent," the Democratic senator told reporters.

On Saturday, Republican Senator Graham announced that he was dropping out of the effort with Kerry and Independent Senator Joseph Lieberman to craft a climate change bill, which would also encourage U.S. production of nuclear energy and offshore oil.

Graham said he was angered by Senate Democratic leaders and the White House talking up the possibility of tackling immigration reform prematurely, complaining it could take away time in the Senate for a climate debate.

On Monday, Graham, speaking to reporters, seemed to go further by saying that any discussion of immigration reform this year, even if it is after passage of a climate bill, would be "breaking faith with me."

Kerry did not respond directly when asked whether he would go ahead with a public unveiling of climate change bill without Graham's support.

"We're working to get this back on track, that's my goal, that's other people's goal and we're sticking by that," Kerry said.

The EPA analysis is an important step in the legislative process. The Congressional Budget

Office also is likely to conduct its own analysis, and the oil industry wants the Energy Department's Energy Information Administration to take an independent look.

# JUNE DEBATE IN THE SENATE

Over the past six months, Kerry, Graham and Lieberman have been writing a bill aimed at reducing U.S. emissions of carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases by 17 percent by 2020, from 2005 levels.

That goal is in line with commitments President Barack Obama made in Copenhagen last December during an international summit that attempted to set new global goals for tackling environmental problems associated with climate change.

The EPA analysis of their bill could take more than a month to complete and legislation could not be queued up for a full Senate debate until the results are disseminated.

That would put the climate bill on the Senate floor in June at the earliest, but more likely in July. But that assumes that political divisions, of which there are many in addition to Graham's concerns, get resolved.

Last week, the National Research Council reported that the chemistry of the world's oceans was changing at "an unprecedented rate," rapidly becoming more acidic, because of carbon dioxide pollution.

That change threatens coral reefs and some fish species.

Other looming global warming problems, according to scientists, include more severe droughts, flooding of island nations and coastal cities as sea levels rise from ice melt, and worsening refugee problems.

Kerry also has been casting the climate debate in national security tones. He joined veterans of the Iraq war to unveil a clock that counted U.S. revenues Iran would be deprived of as the United States lowers carbon emissions from burning imported oil and from fostering energy independence.

The clock, adorned with Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad's picture, is measuring \$100 million a day in potential lost revenues to Tehran, which has been engaged in a war of words with Washington over its suspected nuclear weapons program and its alleged human rights violations.

Car dealers, however, have supported efforts to limit EPA's climate rules. The National Automobile Dealers Association has lent its support to the Murkowski effort, arguing it would have no impact on the administration's overall fuel economy and emissions goals, and would instead give automakers clearer targets (<u>*E&ENews PM*</u>, March 2).

Several top House Republicans today blasted EPA's endangerment finding, arguing that the science underpinning the determination is deeply flawed.

"It's no secret that I don't believe the endangerment finding that the Environmental Protection Agency put out in April has been properly done," said Energy and Commerce Committee ranking member Joe Barton (R-Texas). Barton pressed Jackson on reports that the views of an EPA employee were suppressed as EPA prepared to issue its endangerment finding, but Jackson insisted that her staff had considered the employee's views during the comment period and that she had not seen anything to upend the science underpinning the endangerment finding.
