# EPA URBAN WATERS SMALL GRANTS

Past Grants, Current Cycle

#### Past:

Awarded \$5.2M nation-wide to 92 organizations across the country and Puerto Rico.

# FIVE STAR & URBAN WATERS RESTORATION NATIONAL FISH AND WILDLIFE FOUNDATION

"Develop community capacity for urban waterway restoration projects by funding diverse local partnerships

#### **EPA Urban Waters contribution:**

\$767,000, 95 projects, \$4.518 million in matching funds.

- By July 2015, over 3 years, there were 155 grants across the country with total Federal funds of \$2.83 Million and total private and match funds of \$16 Million
- •In 2016, the 4<sup>th</sup> year, funding for this grant program will likely fund an additional 60 projects with funds from EPA, the US Forest Service, the US Fish and Wildlife Service, Southern Company, FedEx, Alcoa Foundation, Pacific Gas and Electric Company, and another anonymous Foundation.









# PROJECT GOALS: GRAND RIVER REVITALIZATION & RAPIDS RESTORATION

- •Restore the rapids to the Grand River for everyone, with enhanced access and recreational opportunities
- •Improve habitat and connectivity, water quality, riparian functions and aesthetics
- •Create economic opportunities, enhance underserved communities and instill stewardship ethic



## PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

- Remove five aging low-head dams
- Reveal the submerged natural bedrock rapids
- Recreate lower rapids by installing boulders and cobble
- Restore historic spawning areas for state-threatened
   Lake Sturgeon & improve habitat areas for other aquatic species
- Provide increases accessibility to the river for a variety of recreational users resulting in significant social, economic, and environmental benefits
- Construct a new adjustable structure to prevent nonnative sea lamprey from migrating upstream



# PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

- Provide Grand Rapids Public School (GRPS) students with hands on environmental educational opportunities by incorporating the Grand Revitalization into GRPS curriculum.
- Improve river conditions for selected threatened and endangered species
- Significant social, economic, and environmental benefits
- The community is turning to face the river as uniting factor connecting East & West neighborhoods






# PROJECT FUTURE













#### NUMBER OF START-UPS BY INDUSTRY CATEGORY GRAND RAPIDS AREA





## LESSONS LEARNED

Continuous (Visioning) Outreach and Ongoing Public Engagement is Essential .... "the Grand River belongs to everyone" and must be restored in a way from which all benefit."

A Dedicated Public-Private Partnership Organization ...provides a coherent "face" for and "go to" group for these large scale restoration initiatives

Sustainable funding is an ongoing challenge for all of the examples examined, especially for operations and maintenance.... NGO organizations depend on a combination of public and private funding – and require ongoing fundraising both for capital projects and, especially, for operations and maintenance.

Limits of Relevance of Models Examined.... there is no one organizational model from those examined suitable to perform satisfactorily all of the tasks identified by the Work Group






Figure 1: Project Path Forward
