Potential Funding Opportunity:

Technical Assistance to Create Healthy, Economically Vibrant Communities

EPA's Office of Sustainable Communities and federal agency partners invite communities to apply for technical assistance to help communities revitalize their economy, improve health, and protect the environment.

• Local Foods, Local Places helps communities reinvest in existing neighborhoods and revitalize downtowns through the development of local food systems. To date, nearly 80 communities have benefitted from assistance with support from EPA, the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the U.S. Department of Transportation, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, the Appalachian Regional Commission, and the Delta Regional Authority.

• Healthy Places for Healthy People helps community leaders and health care partners focus on health as an economic driver and catalyst for downtown and neighborhood revitalization. Health care partners include community health centers (including Federally Qualified Health Centers), nonprofit hospitals, and other health care facilities. To date, 10 communities have benefitted from assistance with support from EPA and the Appalachian Regional Commission. Healthy Places for Healthy People provides assistance for communities that are economically challenged, including those in rural Appalachia.

Submitting Project Proposals

The California Air Resources Board (ARB) Supplemental Environmental Project (SEP) Policy allows community-based projects to be funded from a portion of the penalties received during settlement of enforcement actions. SEPs can improve public health, reduce pollution, increase environmental compliance, and bring public awareness to neighborhoods most burdened by environmental harm. We are currently seeking project proposals that could be funded under proposed policy changes to ARB's SEP Policy.

To qualify, project proposals must meet all the following criteria:

- Reduce direct/indirect air emissions or exposure to air pollution (Diesel Particulate Matter, NOx, Greenhouse gases, Volatile Organic Compounds, etc.)
- Relate to the violation
- Not benefit the violator
- Go above and beyond regulatory requirements

Two New Online Courses Available from NAU and ITEP

Northern Arizona University (NAU) and the Institute for Tribal Environmental Professionals (ITEP) offer tribally focused professional development training to new and seasoned professionals through interactive online courses. Upon completion, participants will receive a certificate equivalent to the continuing education units (CEUs) identified for each course. • Tribal Strategic Planning: Developing of Your EPA-Tribal Environmental Plan

• Partnerships and Community Outreach

This course provides tribal environmental professionals with tribal-specific tools and resources to engage their community and other stakeholders in the development and implementation of their tribal work plans. Registration for this online course is \$150. This course carries 0.5 continuing education units (CEUs) and requires approximately five hours of total learning time.

Why is ITEP charging for these online courses and others are free?

ITEP offers both free and for-fee courses, which are determined by current funding sources. The online courses described above are for-fee and have paid instructors to ensure your individual questions are answered in a timely manner. Free courses, listed below, have been developed with federal grant funding and are facilitated by ITEP staff that work with volunteer subject matter experts to field questions.
