




Recycling Challenges

- Reduced markets for recycled materials, and
- Varying methodologies to measure recycling system performance.



America Recycles Network


- Over 270 U.S.-based organizations have signed the EPA's America Recycles Pledge

National Recycling Strategy Objectives

Objective 1: Reduce Contamination Objective 2: Increase Processing Efficiency Objective 3: Improve Markets



Objective 1: Reduce Contamination in the Recycling Stream

- 1.1 Enhance education and outreach to consumers on the value of recycling and how to recycle properly.
- 1.2. Increase coordination, distribution and accessibility of information on recycling programs and policies at the federal, state, tribal and local levels.





Objective 2: Increase Processing Efficiency

- 2.1. Improve understanding of available recycling infrastructure and needs.
- 2.2. Increase awareness of available public and private funding
- 2.3. Continue to fund research and development of new technologies and processes





Objective 2: Increase Processing Efficiency



2.4. Increase consideration of the sorting process in the design of new products.

2.5. Develop and implement national recycling system definitions, measures, targets, and performance indicators.



Objective 3: Improve Markets



America Recycles

3.1. Conduct market development workshops and dialogues to spur market development

3.2. Produce an analysis of different types of end markets

3.3. Increase data availability and transparency about recyclable materials generated and the materials manufacturers need.

Objective 3: Improve Markets

3.4. Increase manufacturing use of feedstocks in the regions where they are generated.

3.5. Increase demand for recycled materials through policies, programs, initiatives, and incentives, focusing on materials with less mature markets.


