Topic	Question	Response	Date posted
Budget	It appears from the RFA that there is no allotment for a 10% de minimis indirect cost rate for an applicant without a pre-existing NICRA. Is that correct, or is there a way to charge indirect costs to the funding opportunity at a de minimis rate?	In accordance with 2 CFR Part 200.414 (f) Any non-Federal entity that does not have a current negotiated (including provisional) rate, except for those non-Federal entities described in appendix VII to this part, paragraph D.1.b, may elect to charge a de minimis rate of 10% of modified total direct costs (MTDC) which may be used indefinitely. No documentation is required to justify the 10% de minimis indirect cost rate. As described in § 200.403, costs must be consistently charged as either indirect or direct costs but may not be double charged or inconsistently charged as both. If chosen, this methodology once elected must be used consistently for all Federal awards until such time as a non-Federal entity chooses to negotiate for a rate, which the non-Federal entity may apply to do at any time.	
Administrative	Can one organization receive multiple awards?	Section VI Paragraph B of the RFA: If an applicant submits applications for multiple tasks/activities under this competition, and is selected for multiple tasks/activities, EPA may award a single assistance agreement that combines separate applications for different tasks/activities.	
General	How would EPA handle confidential business information?	EPA recommends that you do not include confidential business information (CBI) in your application. However, if CBI is included, it will be treated in accordance with 40 CFR 2.203 . Applicants must clearly indicate which portion(s) of their application they are claiming as CBI. EPA will evaluate such claims in accordance with 40 CFR Part 2. If no claim of confidentiality is made, EPA is not required to make the inquiry to the applicant otherwise

		required by 40 CFR 2.204(c)(2) prior to disclosure. The agency protects competitive applications from disclosure under applicable provisions of the Freedom of Information Act prior to the completion of the competitive selection process.	
Eligibility	Our organization is not currently in the position to own and operate large scale trash and garbage capturing devices such as trash wheels, trash skimmer boats, river interceptors and litter traps/nets. However, our use of volunteers and staff in to remove trash along the shoreline and nearshore areas has proven very effective in removing a large bulk of refuse from the River.	EPA cannot provide feedback on specific project proposals and likelihood of success Funding for volunteer or other person-based cleanups are not eligible for funding. See page 12 of the RFA.	
Eligibility	I am a startup based outside of the Great Lakes. Am I eligible to apply?	You might be eligible if you are an eligible entity/organization and your work is occurring in an eligible location. From Page 1 of the RFA: Governmental entities, including state agencies, interstate agencies, Indian tribes, local governments, institutions of higher learning (i.e., colleges and universities), and non-profit organizations (as defined at 2 CFR Part 200) are eligible to apply for funding under this RFA. There are not any specific locations that are preferred by EPA; however, work must occur within the general geographic areas mentioned in the RFA. General	Our waterbody has two branches that converge at the intersection of three communities. Each community is part of a larger partnership working together toward the restoration of this waterbody. We would like to submit only one application for a trash collector at multiple locations. Who should be the applicant? Should we submit under one municipality or multiple applications?	There are a couple of options which could be used. Each community could submit separately, so they would be competing against one another. Also, a single community could apply, and the two other organizations could be Subawardees. General	Does the grant require the purchase of an existing off-the-shelf type unit? The RFA mentions experimentation is not allowed, but how does this apply to designing/engineering the system specific to each site?	This RFA does not require purchase of commercially available "off the shelf" units. Applicants may seek funding for a device created by an engineering or design firm which is customized for a specific trash collection area. 		unproven/experimental trash capturing devices and/or research activities, meaning any systematic investigation principally for the purpose of expanding general knowledge or developing a new solution to a problem, are not eligible for funding.	
Budget	Can the grant pay for equipment and the salary to run the equipment?	Potentially, there should be reasoning in the budget narrative as to why equipment and salary are reasonable, allocable, and necessary. Long-term planning will also be considered, especially how trash devices will be operated when the grantee assumes ownership of equipment and the grant funding has ended. See Section V. Eligibility	Can the grant be applied to Areas of Concern (AOCs) further than 6 miles up from the Great Lake intersection?	No, the grant cannot be applied further than 6 river miles for any areas of the Great Lakes, see Section I. Applicant Information p.6 for more detail.	1/26/21
General	For how many years or hours annually does the partner need to commit to operating the equipment after funding concludes?	There is no strict requirement for the number of years or hours that the device must be operated. Reviews will consider the plan for long-term uses as part of the competitive scoring of the application. See Section IV. Eligibility	I have a boat that can be used to pick up trash. Would this project support the cost of getting the boat in the water?	This grant is designed to fund the purchase of trash collecting devices/vessels. Funding cannot be used to offset the costs of existing trash collection programs. Administrative	Can letters of support be emailed directly to EPA?	Only materials submitted as part of the grant application submitted on Grants.gov will be considered.
