The Office of Inspector General (OIG) for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) plans to begin preliminary research on EPA's progress in meeting minimum inspection requirements under the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) at treatment, storage and disposal facilities (TSDFs). This project is included in our fiscal year 2015 annual plan.

Our objective is to determine whether the EPA is ensuring that inspections are performed at the statutorily required frequency for TSDFs. The OIG plans to conduct work at EPA headquarters and in selected EPA regions. Applicable generally accepted government auditing standards will be used in conducting our project. The anticipated benefits of this project are ensuring public health and the environment are protected by verifying that the EPA is inspecting TSDFs at the frequency mandated by RCRA.

We will work with your Audit Follow-Up Coordinators to arrange a mutually agreeable time to discuss our objectives and the purpose of the preliminary research phase of our project. We will answer any of your questions about the project process, reporting procedures, methods used to gather and analyze data, and what we should expect of each other during the course of the project. We would also be particularly interested in any areas of concern that you may have. Throughout the project, we will provide updates on a regular basis, as agreed upon at this meeting.

We respectfully note that the OIG is authorized by the Inspector General Act of 1978 to have timely access to personnel and all materials necessary to complete its objectives. We will request your resolution if an agency employee or contractor refuses to provide requested records to the OIG, or

otherwise fails to cooperate with the OIG. We may report unresolved access matters to the Administrator and include the incident in the Semiannual Report to Congress.
