Dear Ms. Sutherland:

The Office of Inspector General (OIG) is beginning work to update for fiscal year 2016 its list of proposed key management challenges and internal control weaknesses confronting the U.S. Chemical Safety and Hazard Investigation Board (CSB). We also plan to provide you information on internal control weaknesses for your consideration as a part of your Federal Managers' Financial Integrity Act review.

The Government Performance and Results Modernization Act of 2010 provides a government wide definition of major management challenges. According to the act, major management challenges are programs or management functions, within or across agencies, that have greater vulnerability to waste, fraud, abuse and mismanagement, wherein a failure to perform well could seriously affect the ability of an agency or the federal government to achieve its mission or goals. Internal control weaknesses are deficiencies in internal control activities designed to address and meet internal control standards.

We will contact your audit liaison to arrange a meeting date and time to discuss with your staff our process, the status of last year's challenges and weaknesses, and any new challenges for consideration. We hope to have this meeting in February 2016, and plan to issue our proposed management challenges letter to CSB by the end of June 2016. Your input, along with final audit reports, prior year challenges and weaknesses, and any public records, will be used to develop the fiscal year 2016 management challenges and internal control weaknesses.

We respectfully note that the OIG is authorized by the Inspector General Act of 1978 to have timely access to personnel and all materials necessary to complete its objectives. We will request your resolution if an agency employee or contractor refuses to provide requested records to the OIG, or otherwise fails to cooperate with the OIG. We may report unresolved access matters to the board and include the incident in the Semiannual Report to Congress.
