Program Overview: Office of Air Quality, Asbestos Program

- Staff
- Functions:
 - administer the certification and licensing programs
 - receive notices for asbestos renovation/demolition
 - conduct inspections of renovation/demolition projects
 - administer a grant program to assist cities and counties with abatement, stabilization, and remediation for asbestos-related activities
 - asbestos-related outreach and assistance



Relationships: Fostering and Cultivating

- Local Government
 - Meetings and outreach
- Asbestos Regulated Community
 - Discussions on the application of regulation with work practices



- State Government
 - Funding of eligible abatement projects with the Arkansas Asbestos Abatement Grant



State Facts: Arkansas

- Population: over 3 million



Issue: Condemned, Dilapidated Houses

- Over 200 condemned homes/structures, possibly asbestos containing
- Lack of knowledge regarding asbestos and asbestos regulations
- Limited revenue and resources
- Regulated through asbestos regulation

State Regulation Clarification: Nuisance Abatement

ADEQ Clarification:

- Small residential buildings
 - One house, per city block, per year
- Demolition is not part of a
 - Commercial, highway construction, private development, urban renewal project;
 - Project to develop shopping mall or industrial facility
- Demolition not
 - Conducted by open burning
 - Involve small residential building previously used to store farm supplies
- Proper disposal of debris/waste



Success in the Making: Inform, Train, Reduce

Inform


- Mayor Sanders of possible solutions
- Train and Certify
 - The Blytheville employees as Asbestos Inspectors

Reduce

 The number of condemned and dilapidated houses through ADEQ nuisance abatement clarification or though structural demolition
