## II. Chicago Wilderness: Water as a Resource Focus Area— Christopher R. Mulvaney

- > Through its new Water as a Resource Focus Area, Chicago Wilderness seeks to leverage the capacity and expertise of its members and partners to address significant regional water challenges through coordinated conservation actions.
- ➤ Over the next few months, Chicago Wilderness will be collecting and analyzing data and talking with stakeholders to understand the major water challenges and opportunities across the CW Region of SE WI, NE IL, NW IN, and SW MI. Chicago Wilderness will also explore case studies of model approaches to these water issues that could potentially be replicated in other parts of the region. This information will feed into two regional water summits later this year that will bring together key water stakeholders to determine the issues Chicago Wilderness is uniquely positioned to impact and the strategies and actions that should be undertaken.
