INTRODUCTION

Introduction

The US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) developed this guide to help schools and child care providers identify potential funding sources for lead remediation and water quality-related projects. This guide lists 4 federal programs, 79 state programs, and 115 foundations/companies providing funding opportunities. In addition to school and child care facilities, this guide may also be used to identify potential funding sources for other organizations that are concerned about drinking water consumed by children.

This document also provides information on national foundations, corporations, and state and federal agencies that have a strong commitment to supporting school and child care improvement initiatives. The national organizations listed here provide funding for environmental health, children's health, and environmental education projects. In addition, these organizations are committed to serving their local communities.

Background

The EPA encourages schools and child care facilities to implement programs for reducing lead in drinking water as part of their overall plans for maintaining healthy learning environments. Safe and healthy environments foster healthy children and may improve student performance. However, implementing a drinking water quality program that includes testing, remediation, and outreach activities can be costly. To better assist these facilities with addressing potential lead contamination in drinking water, the EPA compiled a suite of materials and resources to help schools and child care facilities implement programs and policies to reduce children's exposure to lead in drinking water. This guide provides potential funding resources to help school and child care facilities implement drinking water quality programs. This guide is not a comprehensive list of funding opportunities for environmental initiatives and inclusion in this guide does not constitute endorsement by the EPA. This information will be updated annually.

Lead in Drinking Water in Schools and Child Care Facilities

Exposure to lead can cause serious health problems, particularly for young children. The EPA has developed resources to help schools and child care facilities implement simple strategies for managing the risks of lead in their drinking water, including:

- Identifying potential sources of lead in their facilities.
- Monitoring their drinking water for elevated lead levels.
- Resolving problems if elevated lead levels are found.
- Communicating about their lead control programs.



INTRODUCTION

- To navigate back to the table of contents, users can click on the state/territory name in the upper right-hand corner.
- To navigate back to the map, users can click on the "Map" button (1) at the bottom of the page at any time. From any page, users can also choose to look at national opportunities by clicking on the "National Opportunities" button (2) at the bottom of the page (as shown below in the example page).
- Clicking on the "National Opportunities" button will bring the user to a table of contents for sources available nationwide that functions similarly to the state sections.
- Users can review the funding sources listed under their state, as well as the national funding opportunities, to identify potential sources of support for their programs.

General Sources

Because information on funding priorities and contact information may change frequently, it is important to confirm the information provided when seeking funding.

In addition to the foundational, state, and federal sources of funding listed in this document, there are other general sources that schools, child care facilities, and funding seekers may look into. There are resources and alternative mechanisms of financing that certain organizations may be eligible to utilize. Additionally, there are upcoming programs that schools and child care facilities could seek funding from in the future. The following sections provide broad suggestions for general sources that fund seekers could inquire about beyond those listed in the national and state-specific sections of this document.

Faith – Based Organizations

In addition to the presented funding opportunities, many faith-based organizations offer sources of funding to schools and privately-owned child care facilities seeking to reduce lead in drinking water. These organizations offer various types of financial support including grants or reduced-rate loans and usually stipulate that the applicant be affiliated with their religious community to qualify for funding. Faith-based programs tend to be targeted at child-care facilities that are located within a place of worship or religious community-center. If your child care facility or private school could potentially qualify for this type of support, visit your religious community's website or speak with a representative within your congregation to find out more about funding opportunities. To get the best results when searching for these types of programs online, use search phrases such as "early childhood development", "lead service line replacement", "capital improvement", "environmental health" or "community development".

Utilities and Municipalities

Throughout the US, many water utilities offer various forms of support for lead reduction that could potentially benefit your school or child care facility. Both privately and publicly-owned water utilities in many municipalities offer rebates or loans specifically for testing lead in water or the replacement of lead pipes. Some services, such as testing, may be offered for free. Contact a representative from your state or county's department of health or contact your water utility directly and ask about rebates or complimentary services for lead testing, service line replacement loan programs, or lead loan programs.

Bonds and Other Finance Mechanisms

Schools are also encouraged to utilize other financial instruments to supplement the replacement of lead service lines and fixtures. The issuance of bonds is a common strategy that schools can use to finance capital improvement projects. In most states, the issuance of bonds by public schools requires voter approval via ballot initiative. Additionally, some state and federal programs offer Credit Enhancement Programs or tax credit bonds to schools that can reduce the cost of borrowing funds for certain projects. Examples Include <u>Qualified School Construction Bonds</u> (available nationwide) and the North Dakota Department of Public Instruction <u>Credit Enhancement Program</u>. If you are interested in pursuing other financial mechanisms to accomplish your lead reduction goals, seek out a financial authority within your school district to learn more about your school's financial strategy.


GENERAL SOURCES

Lead Testing and Tools

Most of the listed opportunities are in the form of financial support, but there are also resources that provide free tools and guidance documents for training and testing purposes. The <u>3Ts for Reducing Lead</u> in <u>Drinking Water Toolkit</u> provides guidance to educate and train staff on implementing lead testing programs. Further webinar and training sources can be found on the <u>Lead Service Line Replacement</u> <u>Collaborative</u> website, and others. For free sampling materials, contact <u>EMSL Analytical</u> for lead in water sampling bottles and your water utility for potential testing services or test kits. Additional funding sources, training and outreach materials as well as other resources can be found in the Water Finance Center's Clearinghouse. These free resources are beneficial for implementing an effective lead sampling and remediation plan when monies granted have specific eligible spending categories (e.g., a grant can only be spent on direct construction/renovation costs).

Capital Impact Partners

This institution provides funds to charter schools in the form of loans.

This program provides loans to public charter schools with 501(c)(3) designation.

Citigroup Foundation

The Foundation provides grants to projects focused on improving cities facing challenges. Eligible applicants must be a registered 501(c)(3), a registered school, university, or a government entity to apply.

Civic Builders

This program provides loans to charter schools to cover up to 90% of renovation costs.

Cornell Douglas Foundation

The Foundation provides small grants to promote environmental health and justice. Eligible applicants must be a registered non-profit organization.

EPA Lead Testing in Schools and Child Care Program Drinking Water Grant

Authorized under the Water Infrastructure Improvements for the Nation Act or "WIIN Act" of 2016 (SDWA Section 1464(d)), the EPA has established a voluntary grant program to assist local and tribal educational agencies and child care programs in testing for lead in drinking water at schools and child care programs. This Lead Testing in Schools and Child Care Program Drinking Water Grant program will include approximately \$43.7 million in funding; with approximately \$2.8 million to be allocated to assist tribal educational agencies. The grant program is designed to reduce exposure of children, who are most vulnerable, to lead in drinking water at schools and child care facilities, utilizing the EPA's 3Ts for Reducing Lead in Drinking Water (3Ts: Training, Testing, and Taking Action) guidance, or an equivalent state program. In accordance with the America's Waters Infrastructure Act (AWIA) of 2018 section 2006, priority must be given to assisting schools and child care facilities that are in low-income areas. AWIA also directs the EPA to provide technical assistance to recipients of the grant.

EPA Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (WIFIA)

WIFIA is intended to spur investment in water and wastewater infrastructure by providing affordable loans to significant projects on both the regional and national level. To qualify for WIFIA supplemental loans, projects must be deemed creditworthy and must cost at least \$20 million (or at least \$5 million for projects serving communities of fewer than 25,000 people).

Farmer's Insurance Thank America's Teachers

This opportunity provides grants to programs that help educate students. Applicants must be a teacher at the respective school holding the program.

Ford Foundation

The Foundation provides a variety of grant opportunities with unique priorities.

Halliburton Foundation

The Foundation provides grants to projects that promote health and education. Eligible applicants must be a registered 501(c)(3) or a political subdivision (schools, municipal foundations, etc.).

Highmark Foundation

The Foundation provides grants for lead testing but not remediation. Eligible applicants must be a registered non-profit organization.

EPA Lead Testing in Schools and Child Care Program Drinking Water Grant

Opportunity Description: Authorized under the Water Infrastructure Improvements for the Nation Act or "WIIN Act" of 2016 (SDWA Section 1464(d)), the EPA has established a voluntary grant program to assist local and tribal educational agencies and child care programs in testing for lead in drinking water at schools and child care programs. This Lead Testing in Schools and Child Care Program Drinking Water Grant program will include approximately \$43.7 million in funding; with approximately \$2.8 million to be allocated to assist tribal educational agencies. The grant program is designed to reduce exposure of children, who are most vulnerable, to lead in drinking water at schools and child care facilities, utilizing the EPA's 3Ts for Reducing Lead in Drinking Water (3Ts: Training, Testing, and Taking Action) guidance, or an equivalent state program.

Special Notes: In accordance with the America's Waters Infrastructure Act (AWIA) of 2018 section 2006, priority must be given to assisting schools and child care facilities that are in low-income areas. Includes a tribal allotment.





Funding Cycle: Annually (through 2021). Estimated Funding: \$43,700,000 for FY 2018 & FY 2019.

<u>Eligibility</u>: The EPA has received Notices of Intent to Participate (NOIPs) from all 50 states and the District of Columbia for FY 2018 and FY 2019. The grant allotments are available on the EPA's website and are based on a funding formula that includes factors for population, disadvantaged communities, and lead exposure.

Eligible Organization Type(s): Grants will be awarded to states to assist local educational agencies. Local educational agencies include agencies as defined in section 8101 of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965; tribal education agencies as defined in section 3 of the National Environmental Education Act; and owners or operators of child care facilities.

Funding Priorities: Testing lead in drinking water in schools and child care programs.

Opportunity Description: WIFIA is intended to spur investment in water and wastewater infrastructure by providing affordable loans to significant projects on both the regional and national level. To qualify for WIFIA supplemental loans, projects must be deemed creditworthy and must cost at least \$20 million (or at least \$5 million for projects serving communities of fewer than 25,000 people).

<u>Special Notes</u>: WIFIA can also supplement, not replace, loan assistance that is available through State Revolving Fund (SRF) programs.

Funding Cycle: Annually.

Minimum project cost: \$5 Million (communities < 25,000 people) - \$20,000,000 (communities > 25,000 people).

Estimated Yearly Funding: \$55,000,000.
