been attending these calls that, wow, this is a lot, a meeting every two

21 00:01:37,860 --> 00:01:38,880 weeks, is a lot.

00:01:52,230 --> 00:01:57,450 leadership of Administrator Regan and President Biden and Vice President Harris

# 26

00:01:58,170 --> 00:02:03,150 having a multi-hour community engagement call every two weeks is a lot.

facing environmental justice challenges across the United States.

130 00:09:55,930 --> 00:09:57,360 some engagement on Justice 40.

132 00:10:00,460 --> 00:10:05,530 coming up. Then we just want to open it up for some dialogue.

# 153

00:11:17,710 --> 00:11:21,070 community leaders and other partners across the United States on EJ.

154 00:11:21,370 --> 00:11:29,200 I see already Adrian Wren has a question about the expected release of the request

#### 155

00:11:29,200 --> 00:11:34,600 for proposals for our colleagues and our air shop for their community air monitoring

# 156

00:11:34,600 --> 00:11:40,930 program. I believe they're planning for that around the beginning of the calendar year is

### 157

00:11:40,930 --> 00:11:43,740 the plan. I think it's around January.

# 158

00:11:43,750 --> 00:11:47,680 If any of our air colleagues are on, listening,

# 159

00:11:47,680 --> 00:11:51,760 I know you can't. You can either put an answer in the form of a question,

### 160

00:11:53,820 --> 00:11:58,350 there, and I'll see it, or if any of our air colleagues, if you were on Microsoft Teams,

### 166

00:12:14,250 --> 00:12:17,340 where we are with American Rescue Plan funding here in a minute.

#### 167

00:12:17,490 --> 00:12:20,080 Victoria Robinson: Matthew, just real quick, I wanted to add that

### 179

00:13:02,290 --> 00:13:05,020 I've put very clearly in a number of places now.

# 180

00:13:05,020 --> 00:13:11,680 It is an unprecedented, a historic level of activity on equity and justice at EPA today.

#### 181

00:13:12,340 --> 00:13:14,950 I don't think that is in any way an exaggeration.

#### 182

00:13:14,950 --> 00:13:19,900 I think we're in an unprecedented and historic time for advancing equity and

### 183 00:13:19,900 --> 00:13:23,350 justice because of the leadership of the President and Vice President, because of the

184

00:13:23,350 --> 00:13:27,370 leadership of other secretaries such as Administrator Regan.

# 185

00:13:27,850 --> 00:13:31,540 I just wanted to make sure folks were aware of what all these pieces are because

#### 186

00:13:31,540 --> 00:13:36,820 several of these pieces are going to hit in October and through the rest of the fall and

#### 187

00:13:36,820 --> 00:13:40,450 are specifically the things that we're going to need to hear back from everybody on.

### 188

00:13:41,050 --> 00:13:46,240 First of all, I just want to point out that Administrator Regan, his first message

#### 189

00:13:46,240 --> 00:13:52,390 to EPA after he was confirmed as the Administrator was his commitment on

### 190

00:13:52,390 --> 00:13:53,680 environmental justice.

00:13:53,920 --> 00:13:55,720 It's not something that came out in his first year.

192 00:13:55,720 --> 00:13:57,430 It's the first thing.

# 193

00:13:57,460 --> 00:14:01,270 The first communication that he sent to all of EPA. 194 00:14:01,270 --> 00:14:05,890 A tailored communication was his commitment on environmental justice, where he pointed to

#### 195

00:14:05,890 --> 00:14:09,190 some of the executive orders that the President had already signed.

#### 196

00:14:09,220 --> 00:14:14,440 He pointed to priority areas that were obvious from community leaders and

#### 197

00:14:14,440 --> 00:14:20,000 organizations across the United States about high priority things such as our enforcement

### 198

00:14:20,000 --> 00:14:26,540 efforts out of the Office of Enforcement and Compliance Assurance, about our need to really

#### 199

00:14:26,540 --> 00:14:32,060 make sure that we are operating in a nation to nation basis with our tribal partners,

#### 200

00:14:33,350 --> 00:14:38,660 that we're engaging disproportionately impacted communities and everything that we

#### 201

00:14:38,660 --> 00:14:44,030 do. Just want to point out if that was really... to me, that was the

# 202

00:14:44,030 --> 00:14:50,390 Administrator on about as close to day one as you can get, signaling to EPA, signaling to 203 00:14:50,390 --> 00:14:51,940 everyone at the agency,

# 204

00:14:51,950 --> 00:14:58,430 environmental justice is back and we're centering the achievement of EPA's mission on

# 205

00:14:58,430 --> 00:15:00,350 achieving environmental justice.

# 206

00:15:00,380 --> 00:15:05,300 I'm really looking at where are those communities that are not protected, that don't

# 207

00:15:05,300 --> 00:15:10,160 have clean air, clean water, clean land, access to a clean environment?

#### 208

00:15:10,310 --> 00:15:14,210 Where are those communities and what are we going to do about it in this time, in this

#### 209

00:15:14,210 --> 00:15:19,040 administration to finally deliver EPA's mission to those communities?

# 210

00:15:19,400 --> 00:15:22,550 I think that's just a really nice starting off point to ground

# 211

00:15:22,550 --> 00:15:31,610 everything we're doing at EPA right now, are very much the central focus on paper, in

# 212

00:15:31,610 --> 00:15:33,260 writing of this Administrator.

213 00:15:33,920 --> 00:15:38,450 There are two different executive orders, and we're mainly talking about the one I'm going

#### 214

00:15:38,450 --> 00:15:43,580 to talk about next and a lot of these community engagement calls, that has the

#### 215

00:15:43,580 --> 00:15:45,200 Justice 40 mandate in it.

# 216

00:15:45,200 --> 00:15:49,010 But there was actually another executive order that the President signed on his first

# 217

00:15:49,010 --> 00:15:53,830 day in office. Executive order 13985.

218 00:15:53,840 --> 00:15:56,590 I think I got that right, 13985.

# 219

00:15:56,630 --> 00:15:59,320 It's the executive order on advancing racial equity.

# 220

00:15:59,990 --> 00:16:01,240 What it did?

# 221

00:16:01,240 --> 00:16:07,970 One, it's one of the places where this administration has really put as a baseline,

### 222

00:16:07,970 --> 00:16:13,790 put as a floor that advancing equity and justice across the United States takes an all

#### 223

00:16:13,790 --> 00:16:18,890 of government approach, not just all of the federal government, but all of government,

#### 224

00:16:18,890 --> 00:16:25,010 It is everyone's responsibility across the United States to advance equity.

### 225

00:16:25,670 --> 00:16:30,140 What it mandated for the executive branch of the federal government is that

#### 226

00:16:30,140 --> 00:16:34,790 every department and agency would look across all of its business practices and

# 227

00:16:34,790 --> 00:16:41,060 figure out what are the barriers to being equitable in how we govern and how we

#### 228

00:16:41,060 --> 00:16:44,490 actually affect the business of government in the United States.

#### 229

00:16:44,510 --> 00:16:48,110 What are we going to do to punch through those barriers?

#### 230

00:16:48,680 --> 00:16:56,750 At EPA, we developed six work groups to try to break down the big business streams of

# 231

00:16:56,750 --> 00:17:05,390 the agency, everything from procurement and grants and contracts, to data, to research. 232 00:17:05,780 --> 00:17:09,280 How do we engage with communities and other stakeholders?

# 233

00:17:09,350 --> 00:17:16,010 Then what are the barriers to equity in our policy, and rules, and permits, and

# 234

00:17:16,010 --> 00:17:21,140 licensing, right into things where we actually come in the EPA and think for a year

### 235

00:17:21,140 --> 00:17:24,530 or two, or 10, about the actual policy?

#### 236

00:17:24,710 --> 00:17:26,900 How do we do equity in those places?

# 237

00:17:27,470 --> 00:17:31,670 We've already turned in our first piece of work for this executive order.

# 238

 $00:17:31,670 \rightarrow 00:17:34,490$ We had a barrier's report that we had to develop.

# 239

252 00:18:22,330 --> 00:18:28,120 We're acting equitably and thinking equitably in all of those different ways of

00:18:28,120 --> 00:18:33,070 doing business and all those different pieces of governing at EPA and all the other

# 254

00:18:33,220 --> 00:18:35,860 other departments and agencies are right there with us.

# 255

### 273

# 275

00:20:04,000 --> 00:20:07,780 well as a grant program for eliminating lead in drinking water.

# 277

00:20:12,640 --> 00:20:18,880 resources to clean up or remove diesel engines from across the United States.

### 278

00:20:19,480 --> 00:20:25,750 It's our Superfund remedial program and also our brownfields program are the pilots.

# 279

00:20:25,750 --> 00:20:30,100 In the next couple of sessions, we're going to have some more colleagues come in.

280 00:20:30,280 --> 00:20:31,750 We have brownfields.

281 00:20:31,750 --> 00:20:36,130 I know talked to you all a couple of weeks ago, we're going to have some more of those

# 282

00:20:36,130 --> 00:20:41,920 programs. Join us specifically in the next two or three of these to start talking about

# 283

00:20:41,920 --> 00:20:46,150 what those programs are thinking of and already starting to do in terms of

# 284

331 00:24:17,450 --> 00:24:20,110 That's what the EJ 2020 action agenda was.

#### 332

#### 333

00:24:22,100 --> 00:24:28,040 strategies because we weren't included in the actual multi-year strategic plan of the

#### 334

00:24:28,040 --> 00:24:33,140 agency. This administration made the very clear choice looking back to the

#### 335

00:24:33,140 --> 00:24:36,020 administration's original commitment to EJ

### 336

00:24:36,440 --> 00:24:41,540 that in order for environmental justice really to be a driving force across the

#### 337

00:24:41,540 --> 00:24:46,940 agency and for us to center our mission achievement on advancing justice, we had to

### 338

00:24:46,940 --> 00:24:49,220 be in the agency's multi-year strategic plan.

#### 339

00:24:49,520 --> 00:24:54,610 They've done that, environmental justice and our external civil rights compliance,

### 340

00:24:54,620 --> 00:24:59,750 we're now a core goal of the agency's multi-year strategic plan.

# 341

00:24:59,990 --> 00:25:04,400 We've been working really hard for the last few months, coming up with a bunch of stuff

### 342

00:25:04,400 --> 00:25:06,800 in the specific area.

### 343

00:25:07,160 --> 00:25:10,970 It's the second goal in the EPA strategic plan.

00:25:10,970 --> 00:25:12,700 The first goal is on climate change.

# 345

00:25:12,710 --> 00:25:16,340 The second goal is on EJ and civil rights.

### 346

00:25:16,610 --> 00:25:23,200 Then we have another five goals that are specific to air, water, land revitalization,

research, enforcement and compliance,

00:25:25,220 --> 00:25:33,440 the traditional big programs of EPA each have their own place in the EPA strategic plan.

349 00:25:33,530 --> 00:25:37,190 But EJ and civil rights are goal two.

350 00:25:37,760 --> 00:25:40,550 The plan is here pretty soon.

351 00:25:40,910 --> 00:25:45,740 EPA is going to release a draft of that strategic plan or some information about that

352 00:25:45,740 --> 00:25:46,850 strategic plan.

353 00:25:46,940 --> 00:25:51,740 Then we're going to receive public feedback on it in October into November.

354 00:25:52,160 --> 00:25:56,990 We're going to use this call in the next couple of weeks and a couple of weeks after

355 00:25:56,990 --> 00:26:02,510 that, the two national engagement calls in October, we're going to spend some

356 00:26:02,510 --> 00:26:06,480 time unpacking what is in goal two of the strategic plan

357 00:26:06,800 --> 00:26:09,560 and wanting to hear feedback from folks live.

358 00:26:09,590 --> 00:26:13,400 Tell us what you think, but also just to make sure as part of that

359 00:26:13,400 --> 00:26:18,110 formal feedback process, you all have an opportunity to ask us

00:26:45,680 --> 00:26:47,510 determine what happens.

367 00:26:47,660 --> 00:26:51,110 They determine what goes into people's performance evaluations.

#### 368

00:26:51,110 --> 00:26:53,580 They determine what we ask for in the budget.

369 00:26:53,780 --> 00:26:56,560 They determine what we report to Congress.

#### 370

00:26:56,840 --> 00:27:02,210 These strategic plans, they guide the work of the agency.

371 00:27:02,240 --> 00:27:08,030 To me, it's a huge sign and also a huge relief that we are now included in the

372 00:27:08,030 --> 00:27:09,410 multi-year strategic plan.

#### 373

00:27:09,410 --> 00:27:14,330 It gives us a real opportunity to drive forward progress on equity, and justice, and

374

00:27:14,330 --> 00:27:16,010 civil rights in this administration.

#### 375

00:27:16,010 --> 00:27:22,340 I'm really looking forward to October and November when we get to open this up and we

## 376

00:27:22,340 --> 00:27:25,200 get to have some feedback from folks on the outside.

377 00:27:25,800 --> 00:27:30,770 Also want to say another thing we'll probably use these calls for, not now, but into the

#### 378

00:27:30,770 --> 00:27:37,550 future, as I said, this is a historic, unprecedented time for EJ, and I don't know

## 379

## 380

00:27:39,380 --> 00:27:45,260 than the request that President Biden made to Congress for our next fiscal year budget.

381 00:27:45,260 --> 00:27:46,760 or FY-22 budget.

00:27:47,020 --> 00:27:51,190 I know folks have been watching the news, there's talk of a government shutdown, we

#### 383

00:27:51,190 --> 00:27:54,280 have no idea about that. That's all being decided up on the hill.

#### 384

00:27:54,310 --> 00:27:58,660 But what they're trying to figure out is the next fiscal year budget, because that starts

385 00:27:58,660 --> 00:27:59,980 on October 1st.

#### 386

00:28:00,160 --> 00:28:06,640 And the President has already made a request to go from typically about \$10 million a year

387 00:28:06,640 --> 00:28:10,660 in funding for EJ to close to a billion dollars in funding for EJ. 388 00:28:10,690 --> 00:28:11,750 It's a little short of that.

00:28:12,090 --> 00:28:18,370 There's about \$600 million requested by President Biden for EJ efforts across EPA,

#### 390

00:28:18,610 --> 00:28:22,720 for the Superfund Program, for Water Infrastructure, for our enforcement

#### 391

00:28:22,720 --> 00:28:28,150 colleagues, it would spread about \$600 million across all of EPA's efforts on

392 00:28:28,150 --> 00:28:29,560 environmental justice.

393 00:28:30,040 --> 00:28:31,240 But then it would save,

## 394

00:28:31,240 --> 00:28:35,600 it would dedicate about 300, a little short of 300, but pretty close

395 00:28:35,600 --> 00:28:39,520 to \$300 million just for the EJ program,

#### 396

00:28:39,520 --> 00:28:44,470 just for our grants, just for our personnel that we really have the folks in

## 397

00:28:44,470 --> 00:28:50,500 the regions, at headquarters that are able to really pursue supporting environmental

## 398 00:28:50,500 --> 00:28:56,110 justice at EPA, providing that support for other federal partners, providing that

## 399

00:28:56,110 --> 00:29:00,400 support for states and for our tribal partners and for local governments.

## 400

00:29:00,410 --> 00:29:05,740 Really bringing a robust level of support beyond just grants to communities on the

## 401

00:29:05,740 --> 00:29:11,020 ground. It makes a significant investment in environmental justice and an unprecedented

## 402

00:29:11,020 --> 00:29:13,060 request for environmental justice.

#### 403

00:29:13,090 --> 00:29:18,430 It also requests that the Office of Environmental Justice actually go from being

## 404

00:29:18,430 --> 00:29:21,370 just an office into a national program.

## 405

00:29:21,430 --> 00:29:27,220 We would stand shoulder to shoulder in the EJ program alongside the air program, and the

#### 406

00:29:27,220 --> 00:29:29,230 waste program, and the water program.

## 407

00:29:29,650 --> 00:29:32,500 Again, all of this is in Congress's court right now. 408 00:29:32,500 --> 00:29:37,090 Of course, they appropriate budgets, they appropriate tax dollars,

#### 409

00:29:37,090 --> 00:29:38,770 they make those sorts of decisions.

#### 410

00:29:39,160 --> 00:29:44,710 We are all waiting as well as many other folks across the country to see what happens

#### 411

00:29:44,710 --> 00:29:47,320 up on Capitol Hill in terms of the next budget.

## 412

00:29:47,950 --> 00:29:53,740 We did already, though, receive somewhat of a down payment on that in the American Rescue

## 413

00:29:53,740 --> 00:29:57,280 Plan Act, which of course came out long before the

## 414

00:29:57,280 --> 00:30:03,670 President made his budget request for FY 22, but the American Rescue Plan was the

## 415

00:30:03,670 --> 00:30:09,080 Biden-Harris bill for COVID relief early on in this administration, and there were

## 416

00:30:09,080 --> 00:30:12,970 \$50 million in there specifically for environmental justice.

417 00:30:13,000 --> 00:30:18,220 There were also \$50 million in there specifically for our air colleagues to

#### 418

00:30:18,220 --> 00:30:23,140 provide a bunch more support for air quality monitoring across the United States.

## 419

00:30:23,140 --> 00:30:25,240 That was the first question I answered.

## 420

00:30:25,540 --> 00:30:31,420 There's going to be a big grant program using a big chunk of that \$50 million for air

## 421

00:30:31,900 --> 00:30:34,030 that's going to come out in a grant program.

## 422

00:30:34,180 --> 00:30:37,600 I don't know if somebody provided a better answer than mine, but sometime early in

#### 423

00:30:37,600 --> 00:30:42,250 calendar year 2022. For the \$50 million for EJ funding,

## 424

00:30:42,430 --> 00:30:48,720 I want to make sure folks understand it's not just \$50 million like a big pot of \$50 million,

#### 425

00:30:48,720 --> 00:30:52,210 and we'll get to do whatever we want with it or communities can come and ask

426 00:30:52,210 --> 00:30:53,290 for pieces of it.

#### 427

00:30:53,530 --> 00:30:55,450 Unfortunately, that's not how it works.

## 428

00:30:56,280 --> 00:31:00,450 We don't have a statute for environmental justice at the federal level.

## 429

00:31:00,630 --> 00:31:05,370 We don't even have a specific authorization anywhere in statute.

## 430

00:31:05,670 --> 00:31:12,450 The EJ program actually uses the statutes for all of our other colleague programs. Clean

## 431

00:31:12,450 --> 00:31:18,780 Air Act, Safe Drinking Water Act, Clean Water Act, FIFRA, don't ask me, fungicide

## 432

00:31:18,780 --> 00:31:24,300 insecticide or something, the one that with all the pesticide stuff. We use everyone

#### 433

00:31:24,300 --> 00:31:30,450 else's statutory authorities to do our work and to provide grants that we regularly

## 434

00:31:30,450 --> 00:31:36,500 provide. This \$50 million, it didn't even use all of the statutes we typically do.

## 435

00:31:36,510 --> 00:31:43,140 We typically will use about a dozen of statutes that EPA has, generally speaking in

## 436

00:31:43,140 --> 00:31:48,300 the American Rescue Plan because it was passed through this reconciliation process

437 00:31:48,300 --> 00:31:51,150 that I know a lot of folks are hearing about right now.

## 438

00:31:51,900 --> 00:31:57,390 At the end of that reconciliation process, the American Rescue Plan only gave us four

#### 439

00:31:57,480 --> 00:32:01,080 statutes, and it didn't even give us the whole statute,

## 440

00:32:01,080 --> 00:32:04,940 it gave us specific sections of four statutes.

#### 441

00:32:05,100 --> 00:32:10,290 One of those specific sections was the DERA program, the Diesel Emission Reduction Act

#### 442

00:32:10,290 --> 00:32:15,990 program. Out of this \$50 million, a big chunk of it has gone over to our colleagues

443 00:32:15,990 --> 00:32:18,750 in the DERA program and they are working,

#### 444

00:32:18,750 --> 00:32:23,700 I think fairly soon, maybe before the end of this calendar year, they're going to

## 445

00:32:23,700 --> 00:32:27,120 put out... Actually, I think they've already put out some information.

## 446 00:32:27,150 --> 00:32:33,750 They're going to launch a pilot of a rebate program through DERA to support

## 447

00:32:33,750 --> 00:32:37,380 purchasing electric school buses in low income areas.

#### 448

00:32:37,830 --> 00:32:39,090 Because that's going to be a challenge,

## 449

00:32:39,090 --> 00:32:45,480 we don't exactly know how, especially schools or school districts in low income

## 450

00:32:45,480 --> 00:32:49,200 areas, how they're going to make electric school buses work.

#### 451

00:32:49,230 --> 00:32:54,330 We're going to use this American Rescue Plan funding not just to get the school buses

## 452

00:32:54,330 --> 00:32:59,670 out to those places, which is great, but hopefully really to figure out how can we

## 453

00:32:59,670 --> 00:33:03,900 we do even more of that in the future as more money comes through, whether

## 454

00:33:03,900 --> 00:33:08,130 it's the American Jobs Plan or other things, the Build Back Better agenda.

# 455

We're going to use this American Rescue Plan funding to figure out electric school

456 00:33:13,380 --> 00:33:15,660 buses for low income communities.

## 457

00:33:16,320 --> 00:33:22,080 Another section of the American Rescue Plan Act was specific to our Brownfields program,

458 00:33:22,080 --> 00:33:25,200 It was specific to one part of our Brownfields program.

#### 459

00:33:25,380 --> 00:33:29,850 Because of other parts of that statute that weren't included in the American Rescue

460

00:33:29,850 --> 00:33:35,370 Plan, we could only give \$4 million to the Brownfields program for some of their

#### 461

00:33:35,370 --> 00:33:38,000 technical assistance and job training activities.

462

00:33:38,400 --> 00:33:43,770 We gave them \$4 million that is being moved into the Brownfields program to support

## 463

00:33:43,770 --> 00:33:48,600 more Brownfields efforts, more Brownfields technical assistance and training

#### 464

00:33:48,990 --> 00:33:52,230 in communities with EJ concerns across the United States.

## 465 00:33:52,620 --> 00:33:56,100 That's two of the statutes that were in the American Rescue Plan.

## 466

00:33:56,640 --> 00:34:01,560 The other two that were included were a specific section of the Clean Air Act and a

# 467

00:34:01,560 --> 00:34:04,440 specific section of the Safe Drinking Water Act.

## 468

00:34:04,710 --> 00:34:09,510 That means all we could do with that is Clean Air Act Projects and Safe Drinking

## 469

00:34:09,510 --> 00:34:14,010 Water Act projects. We can't do clean water projects, we can't do surface water stuff.

## 470

00:34:14,010 --> 00:34:18,630 We couldn't do anything with waste projects, like solid waste.

#### 471

00:34:18,660 --> 00:34:20,580 We couldn't do anything with pesticides.

## 472

00:34:20,580 --> 00:34:22,830 It wasn't in the statute.

## 473

00:34:23,520 --> 00:34:30,450 We have pulled a big chunk of this money, though, for our EJ grant programs anticipating

474 00:34:30,450 --> 00:34:36,630 this is why in previous years, we had only completed either the EJ small grant or

## 475

00:34:36,630 --> 00:34:41,220 the EJ collaborative problem solving grant on an every other year basis because we would

## 476

00:34:41,220 --> 00:34:43,950 only have a little over a million dollars.

#### 477

00:34:43,950 --> 00:34:49,740 We'd only do one program at a time knowing that we were going to get this or hoping that

#### 478

00:35:29,610 --> 00:35:35,160 can we fund that are specific to the Clean Air Act and this one section of the

#### 487

489 00:35:41,010 --> 00:35:42,540 than we've had in the past.

00:51:25,020 --> 00:51:30,240 in early November to get input from the NEJAC on a lot of the stuff that we're sharing

709 00:51:30,240 --> 00:51:35,070 in this meeting, in the next couple of meetings, on Justice 40, on the next

710

00:51:35,070 --> 00:51:40,830 multi-year strategic plan, if we have a budget by then, our thinking about how to best

# 711

00:51:40,830 --> 00:51:44,840 use those huge new resources coming in.

712 00:51:45,420 --> 00:51:48,360 We regularly engage the NEJAC.
