LOW INCOME HOUSEHOLD WATER ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Authorizing Legislation

- Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2021-\$638M
- American Rescue Plan Act (ARP) of 2021-\$500M

*Obligation period through FY 2023 (expenditure deadline: 12/31/2023)

Low Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP)

- Grant awards to states, territories and eligible tribes
- To assist low-income households with water and wastewater bills by reducing arrearages and rates charged for drinking water and wastewater services
- Benefit payments are made directly to public water service providers, on behalf of low-income households,
- Use existing processes, procedures, policies, and systems in place to provide assistance to low-income households.

OCS Priorities

- 1. Restoration of services to households that have had drinking water and/or wastewater services disconnected due to arrearages.
- 2. Prevention of disconnection for households at risk of disconnection due to arrearages.
- 3. Reducing rates charged to low-income households where possible to help ensure affordable household water.

Use of Funds/Cost Categories

- Administrative Costs
- Outreach & Eligibility/ Intake Costs
- Benefits to Households:
 - 1. Arrearages
 - 2. Reconnection and late fees
 - 3. Reduction in rate charges

Household Eligibility

- Categorical Eligibility:
 - Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP),
 - Means-tested Veterans Programs,
 - Supplemental Security Income (SSI),
 - Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP),
 - Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)
- Income Eligibility:
 - an amount equal to 150 percent of the poverty level for such state; or
 - an amount equal to 60 percent of the state median income

Vendor Agreements

- Grantees should enter into vendor agreements with public water utility provider. LIHWAP terms and Conditions identify the following requirements for working with water vendors
- If there is not an agreement in place, grantees must develop rigorous procedures to ensure the information outlined in terms and conditions 11h.
- LIHWAP IM-2021-02 Vendor Agreement FY2021

Current LIHWAP Status

- All funds awarded
- 49 States, just over 100 tribes, 5 territories, the District of Columbia
- Grantee plan review- Over \$1B in funding released for implementation
- FRN for LIHWAP Data Reports: 60-day Federal Register Notice





Responsibly charging for development

Developers create majority of local stormwater systems

- Including swales, green infrastructure, or part of a regional system in more urban areas (See Building Cities in the Rain)
- Requirement varies according location and local requirements

Optional one-time impact fees authorized for system-wide impacts (roads, parks, schools, fire)

Can be waived up to 80% for affordable housing developments.


Optional one-time "tap-in charges" or "connection fees" authorized to connect to regional systems (water, sewer, stormwater) or for local stormwater utility.

- Fee varies according to locality for an "equitable share of the cost of such systems", mostly based on impervious area, some density considerations.
- Authority exists to waive or reduce fees for low income units.

Monthly utility charge in larger communities

• Can be prorated for low-income households.

Bonds, state and federal grant and loan programs, or emergency response



CHIP reimburses local governments and public utility districts for utility connections

Must have passed a local housing sales and use tax

Must be for a new affordable housing project


- 80% AMI, affordable for 25 years
- At least 25% affordable units encourages private sector

For utility extensions

Sewer, water, stormwater connections

And system development charges

Local governments must have waived the fees



What CHIP funds:

Planning, design and financing

Land acquisition and site preparation

Utility connections and utility fees

Impact fees & permit fees

Building construction

Landscaping and finish work

1. Utility extensions

- Must be in place before the building permit is granted.
 - \$500-\$700/foot

2. System development charges

- Must be paid before a project can connect. Typically:
 - \$1,500 \$6,000 / unit for water
 - \$3,500 \$15,000 / unit for sewer
 - \$500 \$3,000 / unit for stormwater



Total funds: \$34.6M

Max grant \$2.5 M

Amount	Eligible Applicants	Prioritization
\$16.3 million ARPA	Cities, counties, public utility districts that imposed a sales and use tax	Prioritized for utility improvements within a Qualified Census Tract (QCT), but available to any location.
\$10.7 million ARPA	A city or county with a population of 150,000 or less, and that imposed a sales and use tax	Prioritized for utility improvements for projects located within a QCT, but available in any location
\$7.6 million STATE CAPITAL FUNDS	All cities, counties, public utility districts that imposed a sales and use tax	 Prioritized for Waived system development charges Creation of new fee waiver programs

Program is prioritized in federally designated Qualified Census Tracts, but can be used anywhere.




Timeline



Citizen Stormwater Assistance Program – Customer Contribution Assistance



Stormwater Utility Fees

Total Utility Fee Billed ≈ \$3.1 Million

(Percentage of utility fee)

CIP ≈ 65%















Off Right of way Program

Criteria for Government Assistance

- Stormwater From Municipal source MUST be present. (It is against City Policy to maintain open channels, ditches or waterways where municipal impact is NOT present)
- All candidates are taken first to a Stormwater Team Meeting, and then to the Stormwater Commission (Commissioners are appointed)
- Commissioners then vote on a one time repair based on 4 categories
 - No Action
 - Category 3 (Maximum Contribution \$10,000)
 - Category 2 (Maximum Contribution \$30,000)
 - Category 1 (Maximum Contribution \$50,000)
- All candidates must contribute 10% to the project and agree to maintenance

Gastonia's Stormwater Citizen Contribution Assistance Program

• In 2015 the Citizen Contribution Assistance Program was created as a means of assisting those citizens who meet the qualifying criteria but still need fiscal aid in implementing. Those eligible must have an income below the **Maximum Qualifying Income*****.

***(The criteria used to determine the need for fiscal assistance is operated through our Community Development Department utilizing Housing and Urban Development Data)

Maximum Qualifying Income

The income for the participant per year must be no more than the amounts shown in the following table: (This means the combined earnings of all persons living at the approved project address)

Percentage of median income	50%	75%	75% or Greater
Based on 2016 median income	26,800.00	46,900.00	46,901.00
City pays % of contribution	100%	75%	0%

***The HUD Data Used to Identify Qualifying Individuals.

The HUD data has been updated and the existing sheet shows the Very Low Income changing.
