Funding Opportunities: Sustainable Groundwater Management Grants

- Solicitation open now (through Feb 18) for critically overdrafted groundwater basins in CA
- Future solicitation in late 2022 for high and medium priority groundwater basins
- Tribes are highly encouraged to participate in SGMA TAC (discussed earlier) and coordinate with local groundwater sustainability agencies on grant and other opportunities

Funding Opportunities: Drought Relief Funding

- DWR Small Communities and Urban/Multibenefit Drought Relief Grant Programs
- \$500 million provided by 2021 State Budget; High demand is exceeding funds available but Tribes could benefit from set-aside funding
- \$120 million more funds are proposed in Governor's Jan 2022 budget


Integrated Regional Water Management (IRWM)

- Established by 2002 IRWM Planning Act
- Collaborative effort to implement water management solutions on a regional scale to increase regional self-reliance, reduce conflict
- Concurrently achieve social, environmental, and economic objectives
- Consider all interests and work across jurisdictional, political, watershed boundaries
- Provide multiple benefits: improved water quality, better flood management, restored ecosystem, more reliable surface and groundwater supplies



Tribal Involvement in IRWM

- Tribes' territories lie within the 48 IRWM regions in CA
- Tribes can engage within their aboriginal territories to forge partnerships with water agencies and to address their own water planning needs
- Concerns and limitations:
 - Jurisdiction, water rights, sovereign immunity
 - Ensure participation includes not just as stakeholders or public participants, but as independent, sovereign governments
 - Limited resources and capacity (planning processes such as IRWM entails significant time and expenditures on behalf of participating entities)

Why It Is Important to Involve Tribes: What DWR is Hearing from Tribes



- Tribes were first water resources managers
- Tribes bring unique traditional ecological knowledge practices/values in regional water management to IRWM regions
- Partnering with Tribes opens regions to additional leveraged funding (e.g., Federal funds)

North Coast Resource Partnership (IRWM Regional Water Management Group)



NCRP is a long term, innovative & successful collaboration of Northern California Tribes, counties, & diverse stakeholders.

The NCRP region covers over 19,000 square miles – 12% of California – & includes the Tribal lands & the counties of Del Norte, Humboldt, Trinity, Siskiyou, Modoc, Mendocino & Sonoma. Representatives from each County and Tribes work collaboratively in NCRP governance to guide North Coast Integrated Water Management, and through a new initiative to collectively develop a Regional Forest and Fire Management Plan.

Collaborative, integrated planning & project implementation since 2009, investing over \$67 million in hundreds of projects that benefit the North Coast Region's communities & watersheds.

- Amah Mutsun Non-Federally Recognized Tribe participating in Central Coast and San Francisco IRWM region programs
- Sacred Places Institute Non-Profit working to ensure Tribal voices are heard in Santa Ana & L.A. IRWM region programs

Proposition 1 IRWM Round 2 Implementation Grants Solicitation (2022-23)

- \$192 Million available for various project types:
 - Water Supply, Conservation and Water Infrastructure Improvements
 - Stormwater Mitigation, Capture and Infiltration
 - Environmental Improvements and Enhancements
 - Decision Support Tools
- Applications due in mid-late 2022; Tribes need to participate through IRWM regions






