The behavior of PFASs in waste water streams and biosolids is not well characterized, despite the toxicity and bioaccumulation potential of these compounds. To date, many studies of PFASs in biosolids assess at most a few dozen unique PFASs. It is widely suspected that many of the polyfluorinated substances likely present in waste water and biosolids will transform throughout the treatment process. Additionally, it is likely that novel PFASs are present within these samples which may lead to risks for water supply and the environment. Due to the lack of standard reference materials as well as public tandem mass spectrometry databases, identification of these PFASs compounds is challenging at this time. Additionally, other techniques such as identification of homologous series and common fragments is done for the identification of PFASs, but this is still not a confident identification. With chemical materials available, we are able to more accurately report findings of PFASs in the environment. Therefore, obtaining chemical materials for newly registered PFASs that are not yet commercially available is invaluable to our screening research on waste water and biosolid samples.

5. In all oral presentations or written publications concerning the Research Project, RECIPIENT will acknowledge PROVIDER's contribution of this Research Material unless requested otherwise. RECIPIENT agrees to protect the information claimed as confidential business information from unauthorized disclosure to the extent permitted by law and consistent with EPA's regulations under 40 C.F.R. Part 2, Subpart B. The foregoing shall not apply to information that is or becomes publicly available or which is disclosed to RECIPIENT without a confidentiality obligation. 
