Federal fiscal year 2022 Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF) base allotments from the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2022 (Pub. L. 117-103) are now available. Together with the funding allocated under the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL), also referred to as the Infrastructure Investments and Jobs Act (IIJA) (Pub. L. 117-58), approximately \$3.2 billion will be provided to the CWSRF in fiscal year 2022 to assist states, tribes, and territories with infrastructure projects that help provide clean water to communities across the United States. This is nearly a two-fold increase in funding to the CWSRF this year. This historic level of funding reinforces the ability of the CWSRF program to address the priorities established in the [BIL Implementation Memorandum of March 8, 2022](#), including increasing investment in disadvantaged communities, building wastewater systems' resilience to all threats, and supporting American workers and domestic manufacturing. The base allotment amounts reflect the appropriation of \$1,638,826,000 reduced by the funds directed by Congress towards Community Project Funding/Congressionally Directed Spending projects. Therefore, the amount of funds available to the base CWSRF program this year is \$1,195,186,949. Attached are the allotments, along with the required additional subsidy and Green Project Reserve amounts. Programmatic terms and conditions will be sent to the Regions in the coming weeks. A consolidated chart showing final 2022 Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) and base 604(b)<sup>1</sup> grant amounts is also included.

General information on the SRF programs can be found at <https://www.epa.gov/cwsrf>. Per the Clean Water Act, states must provide at least a 20 percent match to the capitalization grant amount.

## **2022 Base Additional Subsidy Provisions**

Two distinct and additive subsidy authorities are included in the base 2022 capitalization grant.

### ***1) Congressional Additional Subsidy Authority***

Under this authority, states may provide this subsidy to *any CWSRF-eligible recipient*. States must use 10 percent of the funds made available in the base 2022 CWSRF capitalization grant to provide additional subsidization to eligible recipients in the form of forgiveness of principal, negative interest loans, or grants (or any combination of these) to be used where such funds are provided as initial financing for an eligible recipient or to buy, refinance, or restructure the debt obligations of eligible recipients only where such debt was incurred after March 15, 2022.

### ***2) Clean Water Act Additional Subsidy Authority***

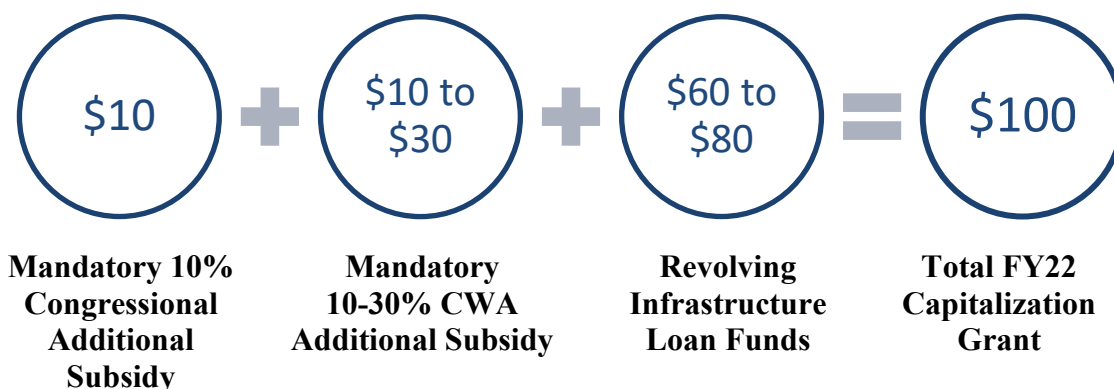
As amended by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) (Pub. L. 117-58), the CWA mandates that states use at least 10 percent but no more than 30 percent of the capitalization grant amount to provide additional subsidy to the following:

- any municipalities that meet the state’s affordability criteria;
- municipalities that do not meet the state’s affordability criteria but seek additional subsidization to benefit individual ratepayers in the residential user rate class; or
- entities that implement a process, material, technique, or technology that addresses water or energy efficiency goals; mitigates stormwater runoff; or encourages sustainable project planning, design, and construction.

Additional subsidy provided from this authority may be in the form of forgiveness of principal, grants, negative interest loans, other loan forgiveness, and through buying, refinancing, or restructuring debt.

\*Section 604(b) of the CWA sets the annual minimum amount for 604(b) grants at \$100,000. These amounts include the additional funds needed to meet this statutory floor when the sum of 1% of all CWSRF BIL and Base allotments is less than \$100,000.

\*\* The FY 2022 appropriation allows EPA to reserve up to 1.5% of the funds appropriated less any amounts reserved for the Indian tribal set-aside for direct grants to American Samoa, Guam, Northern Marianas, and the Virgin Islands.

\*\*\* The FY 2022 appropriation allows EPA to reserve an **annual amount** equal to 2% of all funds appropriated (i.e. BIL and base) or \$30M, whichever is greater, for direct grants to Indian tribes. This amount only reflects the FY 2022 base portion of the annual total reserved for Indian tribes.

\*\*\*\* The FY 2022 appropriation allows EPA to reserve up to \$1.5M to conduct the Clean Watershed Needs Survey.
