

Justice 40 Initiative and EJ Grant Updates

Justice40

Justice 40 is the Biden-Harris Administration's goal to deliver at least 40% of overall benefits from certain federal investments to disadvantaged communities (Section 223 of EO 14008).



Justice40

- There is no specific Justice 40 funding and it is not a grant.
- As written in EO 14008, the goal of 40% is not for any one agency or program.
- CEQ and United States Digital Services (USDS) released the beta version of the Climate Economic Justice Screening Tool (CEJST) in February 2022 and held a comment period which drew thousands of comments.
- Answers to J40 questions may be found in the <u>OMB Interim Guidance</u>.

EPA has a goal to exceed the Executive Order that 40% of benefits of our Justice40 programs flow to disadvantaged communities.

Future EJ Grant Program Planning

2022 - 2023

FY 22 - 23 EJ Grants

Approximately \$40 million for EJ grants

 Context: In 2021, \$18.4 million was distributed for EJ Grants and in 2020 it was \$3.5M

Expanded grant authority for implementation activities

Short Turnaround – all funds must be awarded by September 30, 2023

New Implementation Authority

Previously, EJ grant activities were limited to:

- Research
- Demonstrations
- Training, and/or
- Education activities

Now, EJ grant activities have been <u>expanded</u> to include implementation activities:

- Small scale construction
- Refurbishment and Mitigation
- Hazardous Waste Disposal and general Clean ups
- Installations

Distribution into Office of Environmental Justice (OEJ) Funding Opportunities

\$10 million for Small Grants

\$10 million for EJ Collaborative Problem Solving (CPS)

\$20 million for State EJ Cooperative Agreement (SEJCA)

- States/Local Govt = ~\$10 million
- Tribes = ~\$10 million

Restructuring of EJ Small Grants Subaward Model

EPA

- Agency will provide all funds for EJ Small Grants to 1 - 2 entities to manage the program
- The EPA Project Officer team will communicate primarily with funders, not necessarily communities

Funder(s) - large nonprofit or college/university



- This organization will manage the competition process and subaward funds to communities
- Two or more entities could manage the program collectively

Communities / Subgrantees



- Communities will technically be subgrantees and will receive the funds through the Funder(s) instead of directly through EPA
- Communities will submit reports and project updates to the funder
- One-year projects

Funders Key Details (EJ Small Grants)

- Anticipated Request For Applications: End of Summer 2022
- Award: Cooperative Agreements (3 5-year project period)
- Eligibility: Nonprofits (large), Colleges/universities, & Intertribal Consortia
- Target: 70 80% of total funding be sub-awarded to communities
- Flexibility: Funder may be encouraged to use a hybrid compete/non compete process for selection of Subawardee communities

Communities/Subgrantees Key Details (EJ Small Grants)

- Funds per Sub-Award: up to \$100K for one-year project
- Eligible Sub-Awardee Entities: Nonprofits and Tribal governments

Things to Consider (EJ Small Grants)

Benefits

- Easier Application process for communities
- Funds can get to communities quicker
- Reduces cost on EPA staff and resources
- Potential general support subawards for communities/orgs who have little to no capacity
 - Some orgs can be selected for subawards that will pay them to develop a workplan and build partnerships

Things to Consider (EJ Small Grants)

Voiced Concerns

- Lack of EPA Project Officer and EPA staff involvement with the subaward communities
- Without sufficient oversight, subaward model could perpetuate the existing systems of inequity
 - Worried about the bias from larger orgs selecting smaller orgs.
 - Worries that 1-2 universities across the US would lack local/regional connections with the communities they serve
- High % of funds going to a university's indirect costs
 / overhead
- Concerns about outreach and wide-reaching notice to communities about sub-award opportunities

Subaward Model Expedites Funding Process

This is a Pilot

Connection/History with Communities

Indirect Costs/Overhead Cap

Direct Involvement/Oversight/Scoring by EPA

Cooperative Agreements

EJ Collaborative Problem-Solving (EJCPS)
State/Local/Tribal Govt EJ Cooperative Agreement Program (SEJCA)

- Continue to be managed directly by EPA
- Project Periods will likely be increased to 3 5 years
- Eligibility

Nonprofits and US Territories (EJCPS)

States, local governments, Tribes, and US Territories (SEJCA)

2022 – 2023 Total Budget: ~\$10 million

20 awards (two \$500K cooperative agreements per EPA Region)

Timeline: EJCPS RFA is targeted for release by October 2022

Eligibility: nonprofits and US Territories

Special Considerations

Projects addressing Climate, Disaster Resiliency, and/or Emergency Preparedness

Projects focusing on performing health impact assessments (HIAs)

Projects focused in rural areas

EJCPS Program Updates

2022 – 2023 Total Budget: ~\$20 million (~\$10M for Tribes)

20 awards (\$500K-1M with at least 1 award per EPA Region)

Timeline: SEJCA RFA is targeted for release by November 2022

Eligibility: Tribes, states, and local governments

Requirement: Subawards to Community Groups (20% of funds per project)

Projects focused in rural areas
