


TITLE 17

HEALTH AND WELFARE

Chapter 7: EMERGENCY PLANNING AND COMMUNITY RIGHT TO KNOW ORDINANCE

Part 100—TITLE, PURPOSE AND DEFINITIONS

7.100. TITLE

Chapter 7 of Title 17 of the Gila River Indian Community (the "Community") Law and Order Code shall be called the Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Ordinance.

7.101. AUTHORITY AND PURPOSE

The Community enacts this Ordinance under its inherent civil legislative, adjudicative and regulatory authority pursuant to the express delegation of authority by Congress under the Indian Reorganization Act (25 U.S.C. §§ 461 et seq.), which provided the Community authority to organize, adopt the Gila River Indian Community Constitution and Bylaws (March 17, 1960) and to enact ordinances governing conduct within the exterior boundaries of the Reservation (25 U.S.C. § 476). The Community enacts this ordinance to regulate certain activities within the Reservation as prescribed under Montana v. United States, 450 U.S. 544 (1981). The Community finds that the activities regulated under this ordinance threaten or affect the political integrity, economic security or health and welfare of the Community, including activities of non-members where: (1) the non-members enter into commercial dealing, contracts, leases or other arrangements that create a consensual relationship between the non-member and the Community; (2) the conduct of the non-member threatens or affects the political integrity, economic security or health and welfare of the Community; and (3) the Community provides to non-members the privileges and benefits of tribal services or other advantages of civilized society.

More specifically, this ordinance is enacted to establish mechanisms for chemical emergency prevention, preparedness, response and mitigation and authorizes the development and implementation of chemical emergency response plans for the protection of the Community and the environment. The ordinance establishes requirements and procedures for dissemination of information to the general public regarding the presence and use of hazardous chemicals in the Community and for related purposes. This ordinance establishes an Emergency Response Commission to serve as an advisory body.



Isanti Bylaws

ISANTI BYLAWS

ARTICLE 1. Purpose of the CAT

The Community Action Team (CAT) sets forth these Bylaws to establish the Isanti Community Response CAT that will assist residents of the Santee Sioux Nation Reservation and enrolled Santee Tribal Members not residing on the reservation in preparation, mitigation, response, and recovery to disasters through collaboration, communication, cooperation and coordination with partners.

ARTICLE 2. Members of the CAT

Members of the CAT shall be not more than one representative identified by each of the non-government organizations or individuals (diocese, presbytery, conference, et al) who (1) have provided material, resources or financial support for the work of the CAT and who (2) authorize these representatives to be identified annually as CAT Members.

ARTICLE 3. Eligible Voters

Only members of the CAT shall be eligible to vote on matters coming before the CAT meetings, whether stated or special. Voting by proxy (when <u>organization's</u> principal representative is absent, an authorized proxy representative of that organization can vote), electronic methods, and conference call are allowed. No cumulative voting (more than one vote per authorized member per organization) is not allowed.

ARTICLE 4. Meetings of the CAT

All meetings will be at the call of the Chair or any two of the CAT officers.

Special CAT meetings shall be called by the Chair or any two CAT officers, or upon the request of ten percent of the CAT Members, providing the call shall clearly state the purpose for the meeting.

All CAT members will receive notice and be invited to participate in the meetings.

ARTICLE 5. Quorum


A quorum for transaction of business shall consist of a minimum of three members of the CAT Voting Members (to include proxy, electronic and conference call votes present at the time of the meeting).

ARTICLE 6. CAT Officers

There shall be elected from the Members of the CAT:

- 1. A Chair who shall preside at all meetings, as well as be the chief executive officer of the CAT, and perform other functions as deemed necessary by the Executive Committee.
- 2. A Vice-Chair who shall preside in the absence of the Chair, or at other times deemed necessary by the Chair, and perform other functions as deemed necessary by the Executive Committee.


