EJ Financial and Technical Resources provided through the Inflation Reduction Act and Annual Appropriations

- Thriving Communities Technical Assistance Centers (TC TACs)
 - 17 centers funded by EPA, 3 nationally and at least one per ten EPA Regions
 - National Indian Health Board is to serve as a national center and focus on providing assistance to tribal governments and indigenous peoples
 - Likely to be up and running within the summer of 2023
- EJ Grantmakers Program
 - EPA planning to fund 3rd parties to develop and manage EJ grants programs to provide smaller grants to vulnerable communities working to address their environmental and human health issues
 - Likely to be up and running by fall 2023
- EJ Change Grants
 - EPA is planning to develop a large grants program to implement well planned, partnership established, and implementation ready projects
 - Likely to initiate the program in the summer of 2023

- Supported by the Office of Research and Development (ORD)
- Established in 2001 at National Tribal Caucus (NTC) request to provide scientific support in Indian country
- Forum for interaction between tribes and EPA to collaborate on key science issues
- Only Tribal partnership group with both EPA and tribal scientists and expertise
- Coordinates with National Tribal Caucus to integrate science priorities into EPA's annual planning and budget process



Environmental Justice Tribal Indigenous People Advisor
