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

CPRG Implementation Grants

- On September 20, EPA launched a \$4.3 billion competition for states, local governments, tribes, and territories to fund policies and programs to cut climate pollution
- EPA also launched \$300 million competition for only tribes and territories to fund policies and programs to cut climate pollution
- These implementation grants build on \$250 million in CPRG planning grants EPA awarded this year

CPRG Implementation Grants Program Objectives





Implement ambitious measures that will achieve significant cumulative greenhouse gas (GHG) reductions by 2030 and beyond



Achieve substantial community benefits (such as reduction of criteria and hazardous air pollutants), particularly in low-income and disadvantaged communities



Complement other funding sources to maximize these GHG reductions and community benefits



Pursue innovative policies and programs that are replicable and can be "scaled up" across multiple jurisdictions

Applications can include GHG reduction activities from these sectors

Types of GHG Reduction Measures



Applications may include multiple measures across one or more sectors

EPA anticipates applications may seek funding for the following types of measures:

- A new, stand-alone GHG reduction measure that will be implemented solely through CPRG funding;
- An expansion of a GHG reduction measure that is already being implemented, where the expansion of the measure will be funded through CPRG funding; and,
- A new GHG reduction measure for which the applicant has already secured partial funding and needs additional funding from the CPRG program to secure the total funding needed to fully implement the measure.

Applications will be evaluated and selected for award on a tier- bytier basis.

Applications Must Implement GHG Measures in a Priority Climate Action Plan (PCAP)



Applications may be from:

- Lead organization for Planning Grant OR
- Other eligible applicant that did not receive a Planning Grant.

GHG measures in an implementation grant application under the tribes and territories competition must be included in an applicable PCAP submitted to EPA by **April 1, 2024.**

• An applicable PCAP is one that geographically includes the applicant and contains the GHG reduction measures that can be implemented by the applicant.


Coordination and communication between lead organization and other eligible applicants is encouraged.

- Eligible applicants should participate in PCAP development process.
- Lead organizations should make draft PCAPs available as early as possible.

CPRG Planning Grantees



Eligible applicants can review a <u>complete list of CPRG planning grantees</u> including tribes, tribal consortia, and territories



- States (+ DC, PR)
- Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs)
- States that did not opt in

Tribal and Territorial Planning Grantees

- 4 territories (American Samoa, Northern Mariana Islands, Guam, and the U.S. Virgin Islands)
- 90 tribes and tribal consortia (covering ~225 tribes)

Eligible Applicants: Tribes and Territories Competition



Tribes and tribal consortia, tribal agencies, territories, territorial government and municipal agencies, and coalitions thereof

Individual applicant

Single entity leading design and implementation of the measures.

Coalition

- Two or more eligible applicants with strong and substantial commitment such that withdrawal by one member would fundamentally alter project outcomes.
- Coalition applications must include a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) signed by all coalition partners, or another written instrument or documented arrangement, demonstrating mutual commitment to the project.

Eligible applicants are: • Lead organizations for tribal CPRG planning grants • Other tribal agencies (including tribal air pollution control agencies), departments, or other tribal government offices or tribal consortia	 Non federally recognized tribes Alaska Native Corporations Tribes or tribal consortia not covered by a state, MSA, or tribal PCAP

Eligible Applicants: Territories



Entity	Eligible	Ineligible
Territory	Each territory covered by CPRG (American Samoa, Northern Mariana Islands, Guam, and the U.S. Virgin Islands) can apply for funding to implement measures included in its PCAP. A territorial municipality can also apply for funding to implement measures included in an applicable territorial PCAP. Eligible applicants are: • Lead organizations for CPRG planning grants for one of the territories above • Other territorial agencies (including territorial air pollution control agencies), departments, or other territorial government offices • Territorial municipal agencies (including local air pollution control agencies), departments, or other territorial municipal government offices	

Application Limits



An eligible applicant may:

- Submit one application as individual applicant; and
- Submit one application as lead applicant for a coalition; and
- Serve as a coalition partner on multiple applications.

EPA will not award CPRG implementation grants for the same measure in the same location.

• Entities should communicate and coordinate prior to submitting their application.

Notice of Intent to Apply



Notices of Intent to Apply (NOI) are requested, but they are optional and non-binding.

For the Tribes and Territories competition, submit via email to CPRG@epa.gov by March 1, 2024 and include:

- Applicant name;
- Amount of funding requested;
- 1-2 sentences about scope and sectors of GHG measures; and,
- List of anticipated coalition members (if applicable).

NOIs assist EPA in managing the grant review process.

Tribes and Territories Competition: How to Apply



All grant applications must be submitted through Grants.gov by May 1, 2024.

The application must include:

- Mandatory federal forms (see NOFO)
- Project narrative
 - Cover page (does not count toward 15 pages for workplan)
 - Workplan (up to 15 pages)
 - Budget narrative (up to 10 additional pages)
 - Technical appendix (up to 10 additional pages) documenting GHG emission reductions
- PDF copy of the applicable PCAP(s) serving as the basis for the application
- Memorandum of agreement, or another written instrument or documented arrangement (for coalition applications only)

Coalitions and MOAs



A Memorandum of Agreement (MOA), or another written instrument or documented arrangement, must be included in any CPRG implementation grant funding application that is submitted by a coalition under the Tribes and Territories competition.

The recommended elements for such an agreement:

- List of partner agencies committing to participate in the coalition
- The purpose of the agreement
- Description of agreed upon roles, responsibilities, and commitments of each partner and operating model for the coalition
- How the collaboration and partnerships associated with the coalition will benefit the project
- The resources each partner will contribute to the project
- A statement that the lead applicant accepts full responsibility for the performance of the coalition and will be accountable to EPA
- A statement that other coalition members who are grant subrecipients will be accountable to the lead applicant
- Authorized signatures of all coalition partners
