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1. News impacting BJT programs – FY23 Brownfields Job Training funding announcements

Congratulations to the twenty-nine FY23 grant recipients funded by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Bill. This year's awards represent a dramatic increase in BJT funding to over \$14 Million providing \$500K per grant and an extension of the grant period from 3 to 5 years. With this announcement, 59 organizations across the country will be receiving assistance through the EPA Brownfield Job Training program. Prior to FY23, successful applicants were funded for three years. As a result, BJT training has staggered start and stop dates with new programs entering BJT, developed programs successfully recompeting for additional funding, some winding down their program, and others returning after a several year recess. Here is a rundown of funded programs after the FY23 announcements.

- 8 programs were funded for three years in 2020 but have not received additional assistance.
- 14 programs were funded for three years in 2021 and have not received additional funding.
- 8 programs were funded for three years in 2022 and did not receive or apply for FY23 funding.
- 29 new programs will be funded in FY23 for the next 5 years.

Funded BJT grantees range from first year applicants to those leaving and returning, and those who have been successful in recompeting their program for over a decade.

Special congratulations go out to first time BJT grantees.

Additional recognition goes out to the City of Tacoma returning to BJT after successfully competing for 8 grants between 2000 and 2018 and The Northwest Regional Workforce Investment Board submitting three successful applications between 2009 and 2016.

As previously noted, several excellent and deserving applications were not funded this cycle. Unfunded proposals do not represent the effectiveness or quality of a program but rather a reflection on the response to ranking criteria in relation to other proposals submitted. As demonstrated in the past, first-time applicants often need a second try before submitting a successful application. Alumni grantees often need to rethink their partnerships and expand the scope of their proposals. In each case, the PLC will address moving forward with BJT in future conversations.

Following the tradition of past BJT grantees, those who have found successful strategies can be of great assistance assisting new grantees with the challenges and issues faced by developing programs. As a group, the BJT community can assist each other by exchanging best practices and sharing critical issues necessary for program success.

2023 in-person Annual All Grantee Meeting Tentative date: May 24 & 25, 2023 Travel: May 23 and 26

Alexandria, Va.

The Annual All-Grantee Meeting will provide an in-person platform to continue conversations on critical issues and best practices among successful BJT programs. The full two-day workshop is facilitated by HMTRI with participation from grant recipients, EPA staff and outside experts. As in the past, the meeting will include complementary registration and housing. Travel, meals, incidentals, and other costs are not included. The Annual All-Grantee Meeting is open to BJT grant recipients and organizations interested in establishing local environmental job training programs. HMTRI will be working with participants and Regional Coordinators for the agenda format, guest speakers and topic ideas as we approach the date.

Brownfields 2023 National conference August 8 - 11, 2023 Detroit, MI

The recently concluded National Brownfields Conference in Oklahoma City attracted more than 2,100 registrants and featured 130 educational sessions. The conference is a partnership between ICMA and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and one of ICMA's longest running grant funded programs. To make up for the cancellation of last year's national brownfields conference, EPA and ICMA has announced dates for a conference to be held in Detroit Michigan August 8th through the 11th, 2023. Following next year's national conference, Brownfields will return to the previous scheduled 18 months between events. Educational sessions, registration and location will be announced later in the year.

The Brownfields 2023 Call for Ideas is Open Call for Ideas will close on Monday, February 6, 2023

The Brownfields Conference planning committee is looking for dynamic sessions that will explore the latest and greatest tools, methods, trends, and case studies in brownfields redevelopment and revitalization. Brownfields 2023 will feature over 100 panels, roundtables, topic talks, training workshops, and more.

This year will feature seven new tracks to explore the evolving brownfields landscape, with topics like Housing, Equity, and Minimizing Displacement, Environmental Justice and Public Participation, and Assessment and Cleanup Approaches.

The GreatEST Institute May 8-19, 2023, Bettendorf, Iowa OSHA Health & Safety Instructor Training

The Community College Consortium for Health and Safety Training (CCCHST) Instructors are prepared through a 10-day Train-the-Trainer Program called the GreatEST Institute (Great Environmental Safety Training Institute) to deliver required certifications for public and private responders and workers including:

- 40-hour Waste Site Worker Health and Safety
- 24-hour Industrial Emergency Response
- DOT Haz Mat Awareness
- Confined Space Non-Entry Rescue
- Hazard Awareness and Communication
- Disaster Site Worker Awareness

Instructors use CCCHST curriculum to train workers and responders in their local area and report to NPETE the number of courses they provide, for which they may be provided a small reimbursement. NPETE reports these numbers to NIEHS. CCCHST members may charge for the courses offered in their local area. Instructors reporting numbers must return every two years for Instructor Refresher training offered either at live conferences or through NPETE StayFreshers via zoom.

New EPA cooperative agreements to assist communities better respond to revitalization of brownfield communities

EPA is requesting two major cooperative agreements to assist communities better respond to revitalization of brownfield communities. The first totals \$53 million over a 5-year period and is an expanded version of the current TAB program to service each region.

FY 2023 Technical Assistance to Brownfields (TAB) Grants EPA-I-OLEM-OBLR-22-11 Application deadline - Feb 14, 2023

This grant has the goal of guiding communities through the brownfield assessment, cleanup and revitalization process and helping them understand complex brownfields-related subject matters.

- The solicitation is anticipated to be \$5 million over a 5-year period for each of EPA's 10 Regions
- In addition, a \$3 million grant will be awarded for nationwide technical assistance

3. Pittsburgh Conservation Corps d/b/a Landforce

Thank you, Thomas, and Jasimine for Wednesday's presentation. Please view the attached PowerPoint presentation Landforce prepared for the PLC. Below is a summary of their presentation.

As with the LA Conservation Corps in California and OAI in Chicago, The Pittsburgh Conservation Corps (doing business as Landforce) provides skills and training to preserve green assets while promoting land stewardship in Brownfield communities. With a successful implementation of their first grant in 2021, Landforce has been selected as a grant recipient for FY23 funding under the Bipartisan Infrastructure Bill. The Pittsburgh Conservation Corps is a social enterprise 501c3 nonprofit organization that specializes in assisting adults in removing barriers to employment through a workforce development program. Landforce focuses on land stewardship throughout the Pittsburgh region. Organized in 2016, its mission is investing in people and restoring land.

LandForce is targeting residents of Pittsburgh and nearby communities who experience barriers to employment including communities like greater Hazelwood where poverty levels can exceed 60%.

On average the completion rate for training has been 82% and for transitional employment 72%. Of those who completed the program, 94% applied for jobs, 92% had at least one job interview. 84% were offered jobs or went into industry training within two weeks of the season's end. 100% of 2020 & 2021 respondents were still employed 12 months out, all with raises (average wages from 15.90-\$19.13/hour).

Thomas emphasized the importance of partners in developing a successful technical and life skills training program. 5. Funding opportunities in recycling

The Solid Waste Infrastructure for Recycling Grant Program

U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announced the availability of \$100 million in grants for recycling infrastructure and recycling education and outreach projects across the country. EPA has published two Requests for Applications (RFAs) for new recycling infrastructure grants and education and outreach grants totaling \$70 million. EPA also announced a new grant program for states and territories totaling \$30 million.

The new grant programs support improvements to local waste management systems and recycling education and outreach, meeting Congress' goal to create a stronger, more resilient, and cost-effective U.S. municipal solid waste recycling system.

The <u>Solid Waste Infrastructure for Recycling (SWIFR) Grant Program</u> for which EPA is now seeking applications includes:

• \$30 million in funding that is available for states, territories, and the District of Columbia to improve solid waste management planning, data collection, and program implementation; and

\$40 million in funding that is available for counties, cities, towns, parishes, and similar
units of government to fund projects that improve post-consumer materials management
and infrastructure, including collection, transport, systems, and processes related to postuse materials that can be recovered, reused, recycled, repaired, refurbished, or
composted.

The Recycling Education and Outreach Grant Program

The <u>Recycling Education and Outreach (REO) Grant Program</u> for which EPA is now seeking applications includes:

• \$30 million in funding for projects to improve consumer education and outreach on waste prevention, reuse, recycling, and composting. These education and outreach grants to states, Tribes, territories, local governments, and other organizations aim to reduce waste generation, decrease contamination in the recycling stream, and increase recycling rates across the country in a manner that is equitable for all.

Recycling reduces greenhouse gas emissions by reducing energy consumption. Using recycled materials to make new products reduces the need for unused raw materials, avoiding emissions from mining, and allowing resources to be used more efficiently while reducing the impact on the climate. The Agency continues to accelerate progress through the development of these infrastructure and education grants, best practices and guidelines for batteries, a model recycling program toolkit, and strategies to reduce waste from food, plastics, and electronics.

Communities—oftentimes those with environmental justice concerns—carry the environmental and human health burdens of waste. The grants announced today align with the Biden-Harris Administration's commitment to elevate environmental justice to the highest levels of the federal government and advance EPA's commitment to delivering justice and equity for all.

As part of President Biden's <u>Justice40 Initiative</u>, at least 40 percent of the funding allocated in EPA's SWIFR and REO grants will benefit underserved and overburdened communities. EPA encourages interested eligible entities to obtain <u>SAM.gov</u> and <u>Grants.gov</u> identification numbers, which can take a month. 6. Biden-Harris Administration Announces Availability of \$100 Million through Inflation Reduction Act for Environmental Justice Grants

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announced the availability of approximately \$100 million for projects that advance environmental justice in underserved and overburdened communities across the country. This funding, made possible through President Biden's Inflation Reduction Act, marks the largest amount of environmental justice grant funding ever offered by the Agency. EPA has published two Requests for Applications for this funding through the

Environmental Justice Collaborative Problem-Solving (EJCPS) Cooperative Agreement Program and the Environmental Justice Government-to-Government (EJG2G) Program.
