- Established in 1952 to provide a united voice for tribal governments in Arizona
- Established a private, non-profit corporation in 1975 to promote Indian self-reliance through public policy development
- Members of ITCA are the highest tribal elected officials
- Operate more that 30 projects and employs a staff of 72
- Provide technical assistance, training, research, data collection, resource development

- Plan Congressional Week
 in DC (annually)
- Important changes on critical issues in Arizona that impact Tribes
- Not all tribes have a tribal consortia or organization such as ITCA or a political arm, such as ITAA to advocate
- Develop and submit issue papers from each program on topics that are important to our program; funding, lack of enforcement on tribal lands



Inter Tribal Council of Arizona Pesticide Program Background

- Mid-late 1980's- ITCA Pesticide Program Established
- Served as a conduit for tribal pesticide programs
- At the time, GRIC, CRIT, Cocopah, Quechan Pesticide Programs operating
- Provide trainings, guidance in pesticide inspections, guidance on developing programmatic documents; e.g., ordinances, environmental regulations, inspection forms, priority setting plans, integrated pest management plans, hazardous inventory/assessment
- Provide outreach, education and training






Tribal Pesticide Program Structure

Region 9

- 148 Federally Recognized Tribes
 - 21 in Arizona
 - 18 in Nevada
 - 109 in California
 - 9 Cooperative Agreements w/ EPA (8 tribes, 1 consortia)
 - Tribes with Pesticide Use Ordinances or Regulations
 - GRIC, Ak-Chin, FMIT, Cocopah, Quechan, Navajo, YAN, SRPMIC, CRIT





ITCA Pesticide Program

- PPG- OECA and OPP funding
- Inspections (circuit rider program), agreement with 3 tribes in AZ
- Coordinate and provide trainings, workshops, technical assistance to tribal programs and communities
- Tribal Inspector Training- annually or bi/annually
- Integrated Pest Management Training annually or bi/annually
- Individualized trainings to tribes- upon request and availability
- Pesticide Safety and WPS Training to tribal agricultural establishments and other entities between Jan-May
- Compliance assistance, inspection guidance, other

Pesticide-Related Activities (non-enforcement)

Basic Pesticide Program Activities

Under EPA's GAP, funds are provided to tribes to build capacity to administer various environmental programs, including pesticides..

- Develop basic tribal pesticide program capability and develop Programmatic Documents
 - Ordinances, Codes and Regulations, Laws, Pesticide Application Forms, Neutral Inspection Scheme, procedure implementation
- Respond to inquiries, concerns, tips, and complaints form the public on tribal lands
- Attend trainings related to pesticide safety, use, IPM, certification, pollinator protection
- Provide outreach/education to tribal communities on pesticide worker safety, rules/regs, water quality, endangered species protection, IPM, applicator certification
