

# E-ENTERPRISE FOR THE ENVIRONMENT

## ISSUE SUMMARY:

[E-Enterprise for the Environment](#) (E-Enterprise) is a collaborative partnership among government leaders from EPA, states, and Tribes. A valued, trusted, and successful forum where senior executives engage to identify strategic priorities and solve common issues together, E-Enterprise focuses on projects streamlining processes or optimizing IT systems that are key to environmental program implementation. The intent behind E-Enterprise is to encourage early and meaningful involvement by all parties, leading to shared solutions and efficient application and use of process and technology improvements.

## UPCOMING MILESTONES:

In FY 2025, E-Enterprise will continue facilitating collaboration between EPA, states, and Tribes:

- Following the E-Enterprise Leadership Council (EELC) meeting [held in-person October 16-17 in Denver, CO]: OP2 will collaborate with EPA and state/Tribal (S/T) partners to complete action items identified by the EELC, such as, developing transition materials capturing EE's sustaining, value-added proposition. [The EELC relied upon an interactive agenda, coordinated with EPA Region 8/program offices and S/T members, including a dynamic visit to the National Wildlife Refuge at the Rocky Mountain Arsenal and informative discussions on government use of Artificial Intelligence and several useful updates: e.g., OAQPS Unified Platform for Air Quality and Air Emissions Data, EPA's Climate Resilience and Adaptation Funding Toolbox, et al. In advance of this meeting, OP2 prepared briefing and presentation materials for and held discussions with the EELC EPA co-chair (Assistant Deputy Administrator), CFO, and senior/staff EPA EELC members.]
- Identify opportunities for streamlining and improving environmental program implementation in air, water, waste, and compliance/enforcement with EPA program offices and state and Tribal partners.

## BACKGROUND:

- E-Enterprise was chartered in 2013. Through E-Enterprise, the EPA, state, and Tribal leaders identify and implement process improvement opportunities and data/systems technology updates to boost program efficiency and effectiveness protecting human health and the environment. Five decades of implementing federal environmental programs under multiple, different, media-focused statutes has led to overlapping and confusing lines of program responsibility and management among co-regulators. E-Enterprise co-regulatory partners are committed to improving and modernizing federal environmental programs.
- E-Enterprise is managed through collective conversations, negotiation, and direction-setting in which states, Tribes, and EPA identify and work together on priority activities. The E-Enterprise joint governance model drives transformative change across the national enterprise of environmental protection.
  - The EPA Deputy Administrator, a state agency executive, and a Tribal leader co-chair the E-Enterprise Leadership Council. As EPA's EELC co-chair, the Deputy Administrator (DA) underscores

EPA's commitment and helps to drive and define EPA's involvement. (Currently with the retirement of the EPA DA in October 2024, this position is being held by EPA Assistant Deputy Administrator, Mark Rupp.)

- The E-Enterprise partnership provides a structure and space for the EPA, states, and Tribes to share expertise, best practices, and case studies; identify priority issues; and build and test common solutions to process improvement and technology challenges.

- E-Enterprise operates as a ready-made forum for EPA's National Program Offices and Regions to engage with state and Tribal partners to streamline program processes (e.g., reviewing/approving state and Tribal Quality Assurance Project Plans) and refine technical data reporting (e.g., reducing burden associated with air emissions reporting).
- E-Enterprise finalized the E-Enterprise Digital Strategy, initiated by the leadership of E-Enterprise to align the development of IT systems and manage data sharing. All environmental programs rely heavily on IT systems for collecting, managing, analyzing, and sharing information. As EPA, state, and Tribal IT systems near the end of their lifecycles, partners have the opportunity to make IT investments that are

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in sync with each other. Working together on IT systems and data allows the EPA, states, and Tribes to maximize the use of our collective resources.

E-Enterprise has a Strategic Direction for 2024-26 focused on several priority areas: improving the grant process for grant recipients, advancing CROMERR application, addressing PFAS in an E-Enterprise developed tool that helps private well owners, et al.

E-Enterprise will continue to share information across partners and identify opportunities for EPA, states, and Tribes to work together to streamline and modernize environmental programs.
