

O'Mary also stressed that the committee is advisory in nature.

"We don't have any authority. We are not going to impose anything on anybody or take anything away from anybody. What I hear as the charge is pretty straight and simple — how are we going to pay this debt back that comes dues in 2018?" O'Mary asked.

County to miss Dec. 31 deadline for publishing financial notice

The county's financial report for fiscal year 2013-2014 will not be published by Dec. 31 as required by law, administrator Cheryl Ganey informed members of the Walker County Commission on Monday.

Ganey said Walker County Treasurer Shelia

Rice is several months behind in reconciling the county's accounts.

"The process is that the treasurer's office reconciles our cash to our bank statements. Once that procedure is done, then it comes to me, and I review everything to make sure that everything balances in our general ledger. Right now, they are in

the process of reconciling for the month of June," Ganey said.

The published report typically includes a condensed list of expenditures and revenues for all government funds from the beginning of the fiscal year on Oct. 1 to its end on Sept. 30.

County attorney Eddie Jackson advised the commission that releasing an incomplete financial report is better than not publishing a report at all.

"There is not an opportunity for you to say, 'I can't do it.' You have to put out what you've got, I think," Jackson said.

District Two Commissioner Dan Wright said the opinion of one auditor he spoke with recently is that noncompliance would result in a finding on the county's next audit.

Jackson said the portion of the code of Alabama that pertains to the public report does not spell out a penalty for failure to comply, although it does allow for a citizen or the district attorney to bring legal action against the county.

said.

Rice also noted that the process has also been delayed at times this year by software glitches and a change of personnel in the county administrator position.

Rice said this is the first time that the county has not published its financial report on time since she was elected in 2008

She did not give a timeline for closing out the financial records for the last fiscal year.

"I can assure you that we are working feverishly to get this done," Rice said.

In other action, the commission

• agreed to consider contracting with Rice Advisory LLC, a municipal financial advisory firm based in Montgomery.

Managing director Chris Williams said the firm does not charge a monthly retainer and is instead paid through fees once bonds are issued.

Founder Rush Rice added that the firm could provide a wide range of advice to the county on financial issues.

District One Commissioner Keith Davis asked Commission Chairman Billy Luster if he had received an explanation from the treasurer's office regarding the situation.

"I have not," Luster replied.

Davis also clarified with Jackson that the commission's authority to intervene is limited.

"So besides us asking on a weekly basis to get caught up, there is nothing that this commission can do to speed up the process?" Davis said

process?" Davis said.
"I don't think so," Jack-

son replied.

The commission did not vote on the suggestion to publish an incomplete financial report because it was not part of the approved agenda.

When contacted by the Daily Mountain Eagle after the meeting, Rice said there are several reasons why her office is behind in its bookkeeping.

"My husband was killed in a car accident Jan. 3. I was out for three months, maybe four," Rice •heard from Probate Judge Rick Allison regarding a new act of the Alabama Legislature that gives counties the option of allowing citizens to renew their vehicle registrations every two years instead of on an annual basis.

Allison said making the switch would hurt the county financially because his office is required to refund unused ad valorem each time a vehicle is traded.

The county would not receive an additional issuance fee.

Allison estimated the financial impact to the county would be a loss of \$240,000 if one fourth of vehicle owners elected to purchase the two-year tags.

The commission failed to act on the matter so that no change would be
