RE: Recent overflow of storm drains on April 30, 2017 on October Street, Barrington, IL.

To Whom It May Concern:

On September 22, 2015 I wrote you regarding the Village of Barrington allowing storm drains on our block of (b) (6) - Privacy Street and affected nearby streets of (b) (6) Privacy to overflow into the environment based on faulty and aged drains. You replied, much to my surprise and gratitude.

As an update, our storm drain at the intersection of Street where we live and Streets overflowed on Sunday, April 30, 2017. The Village of Barrington (see their website) has been complying with the EPA request to fix these faulty drains and is currently replacing sewage drains in other parts of the village much less affected than our street, the low point and consistently flooded street when high water accumulates. When first proposed in 2016, the village stated our street along with the other streets requiring attention would be completed in 2017. Later, the village stated the work would stop at the train tracks, leaving our short portion of the project until 2018 due to "budget constraints."

I just want to let you know that while the village is actively making infrastructure changes, our street cannot be ignored. The promise of rectifying our street in 2018 must be backed up with actions. Please do NOT assume the village has complied with the original reason for replacing ancient sewage infrastructure if they only repair streets never affected with sewage run off. Our block of Street consistently has raw, smelly and unhealthful sewage run off spilling wildly out of manholes into our block and the adjacent ones of spilling wildly out of manholes into our block and unhealthful sewage run off spilling out of manholes into our block and unheal

We are hoping for the best in this situation, but after waiting so long for action, can only pray we will not be forgotten due to "budget constraints" when the Village of Barrington has spent so much money in lawsuits against the local railroad, buying out downtown properties only to level and to maintain vacant lots, completely rebuilding a block in the downtown and helping to

restore and maintain the White House historical landmark used primarily for events certainly not necessary, healthful enhancements to the village. All of these improvements were done in the past three years. The Village of Barrington has finances for everything but correcting a long standing infrastructure problem. In fact, at village meetings in the past before 2016, residents such as our neighbors attending with complaints were silenced by board members with the statement no infrastructure issues would be discussed.

Grants were provided to pay for this sewer drain improvement to correct a violation with the EPA. The monies provided should directly be linked to correction of the main problem, sewage run off primarily of which runs off into neighboring (b) (6) - Privacy streets. Please know we are counting on you to be certain our street is not neglected any further. Our health is not less important than home owners on higher ground.

Much of this conversation is redundant for the purpose of stressing the health importance of addressing the drains on Street. We appreciate your constant and proactive stance on helping make communities healthier. In the Village of Barrington, there are no real budget constraints as cited, since the region is wealthy and does not have the burden other cities such as Flint Michigan have encountered with contaminated water issues. Even there, the Governor of Michigan stepped in to help these needy people.

Thank you for listening and helping make America great again with the support of the EPA.
