Re: Rejection of Administrative Complaint

Dear Mr. Scott Anderson:

This letter is to notify you that the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Office of External Civil Rights Compliance (OECRC), is rejecting for investigation EPA Complaint No. 10R-24-R9 (Complaint)<sup>1</sup>, received on September 25, 2024, involving Pedal Ahead,<sup>2</sup> and raising allegations of discrimination on the basis of race against Black residents in California related to the administration and implementation of the California Electric Bike Incentive Project (EBIP), in violation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. § 2000(d) *et seq.* (Title VI), and EPA's regulation, at 40 C.F.R. Part 7. After careful review, OECRC has determined that we cannot accept this complaint for investigation because it does not meet the jurisdictional requirements described in EPA's regulation at 40 C.F.R. Part 7.<sup>3</sup>

OECRC is responsible for processing complaints alleging that applicants for and recipients of EPA financial assistance have discriminated against persons, including on the basis of race, color or national origin, in violation of Title VI and other federal laws and EPA's regulation found at 40 C.F.R. Parts 5 and 7.

Pursuant to EPA's regulation, OECRC conducts a preliminary review of administrative complaints to determine acceptance, rejection, or referral to the appropriate Federal agency. See 40 C.F.R. §

7.120(d)(1). To be accepted for investigation, a complaint must meet the jurisdictional requirements described in the EPA's regulation. First, the complaint must be in writing. See 40 C.F.R. § 7.120(b)(1). Second, it must describe an alleged discriminatory act that, if true, may violate the EPA's nondiscrimination regulation (i.e., an alleged discriminatory act based on race, color, national origin, sex, age, or disability). Third, it must be filed within 180 days of the alleged discriminatory act. See 40 C.F.R. § 7.120(b)(2). Finally, the complaint must be filed against an applicant for, or recipient of, EPA financial assistance that allegedly committed the discriminatory act. See 40 C.F.R. § 7.15.

In general, OECRC will accept, reject, or refer a complaint after considering the four jurisdictional factors described above. After careful consideration, OECRC is rejecting the Complaint because Pedal Ahead is not a recipient of EPA financial assistance. Accordingly, OECRC is closing this Complaint as of the date of this letter.

This letter is not a formal statement of OECRC policy and should not be relied upon, cited, or construed as such. This letter and any findings herein do not affect Pedal Ahead's responsibility to comply with federal laws and regulations, as appropriate; nor do they affect EPA's investigation of any Title VI or other federal civil rights complaints or address any other matter not specifically addressed in this letter.

EPA's regulation prohibits applicants, recipients, and other persons from intimidating, threatening, coercing, or engaging in other discriminatory conduct against anyone because they have either taken action or participated in an action to secure rights protected by the laws that we enforce. *See* 40 C.F.R. § 7.100. Any individual alleging such harassment or intimidation may file a complaint with OECRC.
