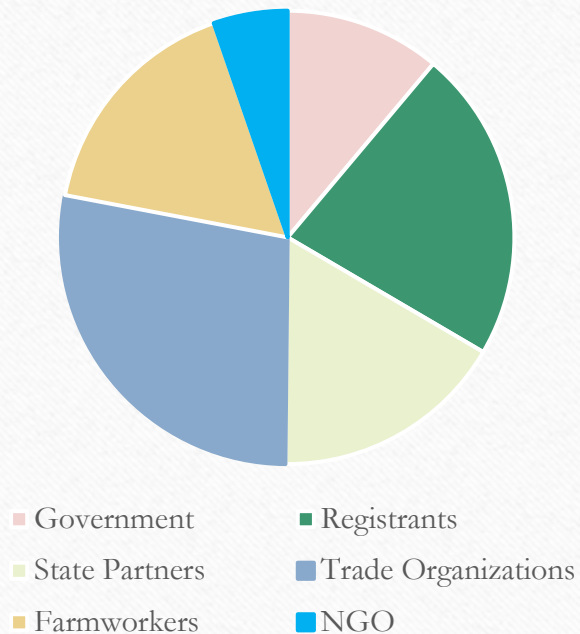

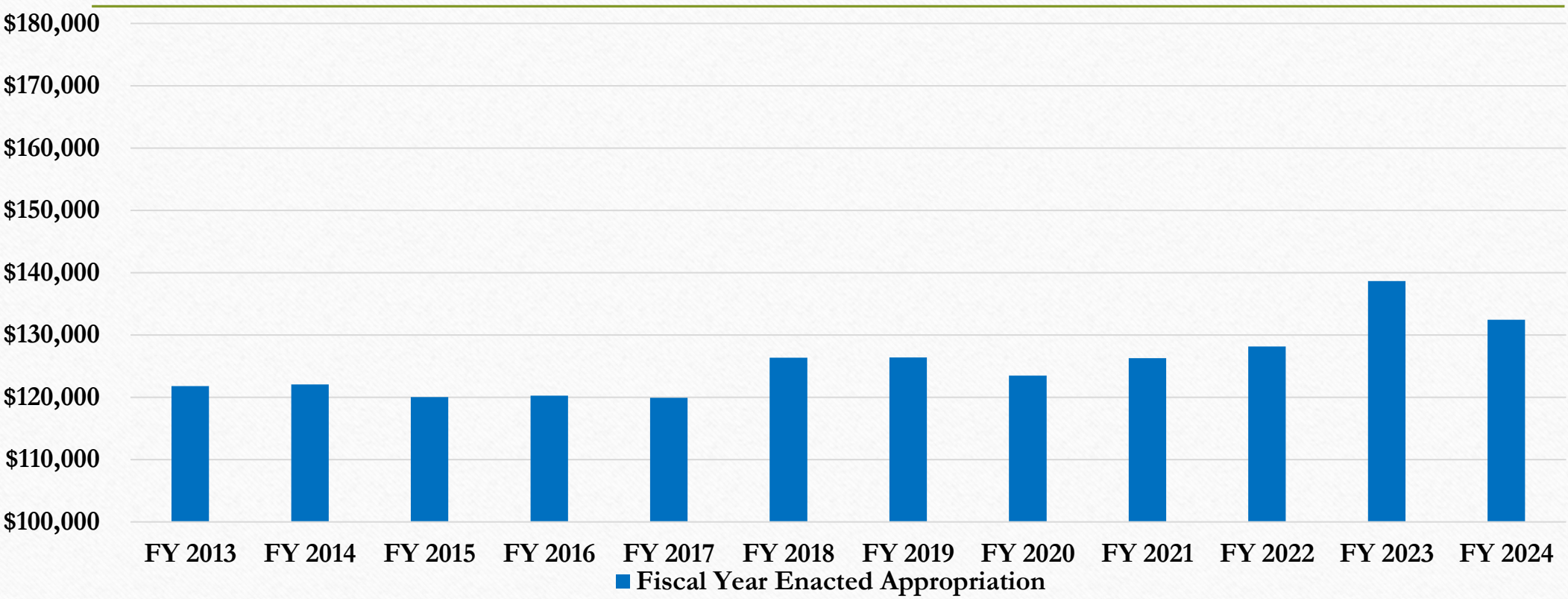
More context: In the face of rising costs and static/declining resources....

- OPP has a wide and complex mandate, including
 - Pesticide evaluation, registration & re-evaluation (within mutually agreed timelines)
 - Occupational and environmental safety
 - Residue tolerances and food safety
 - Enforcement and compliance support
 - Public & Stakeholder engagement
 - Promoting safer technologies
- Persistent backlog of pesticide registrations and evaluations
- Court-approved settlements & Court Approve Actions
- Continues to implement several outstanding OIG and GAO recommendations

Workgroup Activities

- Five 1-hour virtual meetings spanning April 10 to June 10th
- Harvesting existing resources to educate workgroup members on areas of work OPP engages with
 - Office of Inspector General – 25 spanning 1994 through 2025
 - Government Accounting Office – 4 spanning 2013 through 2021
 - Pesticides Enacted Appropriations by Fiscal Year, FYs 2012-2024
- Formulating charge questions
- Outlining methods for answering charge questions, and outlining potential requests to OPP for information

Proposed Charge Question #1

Goal: Identify optimal resource allocations for pesticide regulation to promote economic vitality without compromising OPP's mission of protecting human health and the environment.

- What resource allocation strategies could OPP consider to improve protection of human health and the environment across:
 - **Registration** to increase the speed and efficiency of decisions and reduce the existing backlog?
 - **Registration review** to promote safer use, including greater **worker safety** through WPS and CPA (Certification of Pesticide Applicators) rule implementation and protections for non-target species consistent with the ESA (Endangered Species Act)?
 - Technical assistance, grants, and other non-regulatory programs?

Question #2

Goal: Identify and prioritize possible strategies to improve the cost-effectiveness of OPP resources in protecting human health and the environment by regulating pesticide use.

- What feedback or observations can the workgroup share to help OPP enhance the cost-effectiveness of its various resources?
 - Talented scientists and staff
 - IT systems
 - Policies or processes
 - Non-regulatory programs
 - Regulations
 - FIFRA, FFDCA, FQPA, PRIA, or other statutes*
 - Technical assistance and grant programs

*FIFRA=Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act

FFDCA= Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act

FQPA = Food Quality Protection Act

PRIA= Pesticide Registration Improvement Act

Question #3

***Goal:** Identify and prioritize recommendations for cultivating high-impact partnerships with non-EPA entities in protecting human health and the environment by regulating pesticide use.*

- What are good examples of and best-practice strategies for forward-thinking partnerships and strong cooperative federalism that OPP could emulate?
 - "Strong" cooperative federalism is defined as clear and consistent national standards surrounding pesticide regulation and use, balanced against decision-making at state and local levels, which often involve wide variation in available resources for regulation implementation and enforcement, as well as differences in human populations and natural ecologies.
 - "Partnerships" refers to strategic initiatives with other non-EPA entities (e.g., International Organizations, other national governments, industry, and non-profits)
