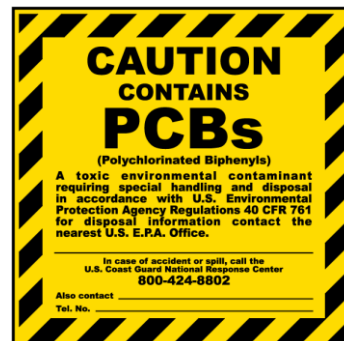


Did You Discover Polychlorinated Biphenyls (PCBs) at Your Cleanup Site?

Contact your Regional PCB Coordinator!

Reach out to your regional PCB coordinator as early as possible after discovering PCBs at your cleanup site for site-specific guidance on appropriate cleanup parameters and to ensure that Toxic Substances Control Act (TSCA) requirements are being met.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency serves as the regulatory lead for PCB cleanup efforts under TSCA. These regulations are not delegated to state or local agencies. Each EPA regional office has a designated PCB coordinator to oversee the proper management of PCB issues within each region of the U.S.

More About PCB Remediation Waste at Cleanup Sites

- PCB remediation waste may be regulated at concentrations less than one parts per million depending on a variety of factors (e.g., the PCB source concentration, the date of release, the location of the PCB contamination, etc.).
- PCB remediation waste refers to materials containing PCBs resulting from spills, releases, or unauthorized disposal and includes materials such as soil, gravel, concrete, buildings, and other manmade structures.
- The TSCA PCB cleanup requirements for PCB remediation waste are outlined in Title 40 of the Code of Federal Regulations in Section 761.61.
