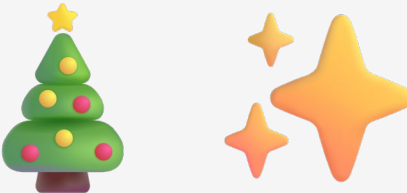

What is the RTOC?

EPA's Pacific Southwest (Region 9) Regional Tribal Operations Committee (RTOC) is a working committee of EPA and tribal personnel co-chaired by an EPA and a tribal representative. All tribes within Region 9 are considered members of the RTOC.

Tribal representatives to the RTOC are selected through government-to-government communication by tribal leaders in various geographical areas within Region 9.





What Does the RTOC Do?

The RTOC works to promote tribal sovereignty, assist tribal environmental protection programs, guide EPA regarding tribal needs and concerns

Why Should Tribes Participate in the RTOC?

Tribal participation in the RTOC is critical to its success and tribes will benefit through knowledge sharing, programmatic support, having a larger voice, learning from and sharing with colleagues at other Tribes



Mission, the RTOC's mission is to:

- Assist EPA in meeting its federal trust responsibility to the federally-recognized Tribes;
 - Provide technical support for the Tribal Programs in the Region;
- Strengthen Tribal environmental and human health and environmental programs;
 - Enhance EPA's awareness of and timely responsiveness to Tribal needs; and
- Facilitate the communication and information exchange between Tribes and EPA.



Goals, the RTOC's goals are to:

- Enhance government-to-government relationships between Tribes and the EPA.
- Promote and strengthen the inherent ability and continuing efforts of Tribes to manage programs to provide environmental and human health protection.
 - Assist EPA in meeting the principles of the EPA Indian Policy, originally adopted in 1984.
- Foster and encourage a partnership, promote understanding, and bridge gaps between Tribal and EPA government cultures, and build relationships to improve environmental and human health protection on Indian lands.
- Demonstrate leadership in Tribal government and federal agency relations by developing strategies and recommendations for regional resources and operating policies, based on the EPA Indian Policy.



Region 9 RTOC Tribal Representative – Roles & Expectations

Core Expectations:

1. Representation and Advocacy

- Actively represent the interests, priorities, and concerns of the Tribes you represent within Region 9.
- Advocate for the protection of tribal sovereignty, environmental resources, and public health.

2. Communication and Information Sharing

- Provide timely updates to Tribal leadership, environmental staff, and community members on RTOC discussions, initiatives, and opportunities.
- Actively engage participation from the Tribes you represent and bring forward Tribal concerns, success stories, and emerging issues to the RTOC for discussion and collaboration.

3. Engagement and Participation

- Attend and actively participate in all scheduled RTOC meetings.
- Prepare in advance by reviewing agendas, materials, and relevant policy updates.
- Engage in discussions, workgroups, and subcommittees as needed.

4. Collaboration and Coordination

- Work collaboratively with other Tribal representatives, EPA Region 9 staff, and partner organizations.
- Support consensus-building efforts while ensuring tribal voices are respected and heard.

5. Technical and Policy Awareness

- Maintain a working knowledge of environmental programs, regulations, and policies impacting tribal communities.
- Seek out training and capacity-building opportunities to strengthen effectiveness in the role.

6. Accountability and Professionalism

- Conduct all activities with integrity, respect, and professionalism.
- Follow through on commitments, action items, and assigned tasks.
- Uphold confidentiality when sensitive information is discussed.

7. Feedback and Continuous Improvement

- Provide constructive feedback on RTOC processes and recommend improvements to enhance Tribal engagement and effectiveness.
- Help identify barriers to participation and propose solutions.

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What is the National Tribal Caucus (NTC)

The National Tribal Caucus (NTC) is a national body of high-level tribal representatives who work with the EPA to exchange views, information, and advice on EPA's tribal programs. Members are selected on a regional basis by each Regional Tribal Operations Committee (RTOC) or its equivalent. Their primary focus is to identify and address tribal environmental issues that are national in scope, crossagency or crossmedia in nature, or that may be emerging or urgent.



NTOC's Mission

The NTOC serves as a forum for federally recognized tribes to work with EPA Senior Leadership on policy and resource matters related to tribal capacity building, environmental program development and implementation in Indian country. Further, the NTOC identifies mechanisms for federally recognized tribes and EPA to facilitate actions that protect human health and the environment in Indian country. The NTOC seeks to implement this mission in a manner consistent with EPA's 1984 Indian Policy, the federal trust responsibility to federally recognized tribes, federal laws, regulations, policies, and guidance as well as tribal values and interests. The 1984 Indian Policy states that EPA will work directly with tribes on a one-to-one (or Nation-to-Nation) basis and not as political subdivisions of States or other governmental units. The interactions of the NTOC do not substitute for this government-to-government relationship between EPA and federally recognized tribes.
