The proposed Regional Community Energy Strategy (ReCES) and the LinkUS West Broad Mobility Project align with the City's goal of achieving net-zero emissions by 2050 and are key priorities identified in our region's Priority Climate Action Plan.

Columbus's West Broad transit corridor serves historically underrepresented and underserved neighborhoods on the City's west side, and we are committed to developing this corridor in a way that meets the needs expressed by the community.
